

Chicago, March 21 .- Wheat trade responded to the cry of damage from Kansas and the central west and options closed 1-4 to 5-8c a bushel higher than Saturday.

Cries of damage are now coming from every section and while the trade is inclined to believe that many of the reports are false, it is quite apparent that there is fire where so much smoke exists.

Foreign markets were weak and lower with selling presure quite pronounced at Liverpool. Market there opened 3-8d lower and closed 1-2 to 3-4d below the previous session. At Paris the market closed 1-4c to 1-2c lower and flour was likewise lower. Primary markets showed a very firm feeling and at Kansas City mill-


