# STEERS MAINTAINED AT \$6.75 IN YARDS

## TOP QUALITY ARRIVES AND BRINGS THE LIMIT

Ten Loads From Idaho Sell at Recent Limit Although More Was Asked: Light Steers Move at \$6.40.

Portland Union Stockyards, Stockdale, March 24.—Cattle prices gathered around the \$7 mark today and broke all previous records for this and other Pacific coast markets.

Top steers sold at \$6.75 in the yards today, although some effort was made to stretch the price to \$7. Ten loads of steers were sold at this price. The California shipment of steers brought \$6.40. These were light, though of good quality. Hogs sold up to \$11.10.

Operations at Stockdale were quite fair, there being a run of 778 head of cattle, 115 hogs and 55 sheep during the 24 hours. A large per cent of the cattle arrivals were of good quality. The best stuff in today came from Idaho, but some very good quality was shown among the arrivals from California.

Other lines of livestock held firm, with practically the same prices in effect as yesterday.

Among the Shippers. Goodale & Cassidy had in eight loads of cattle from Mount Hebron, Cal.

J. C. Davis was an arrival from Shedd's with a mixed load of hogs and sheep.

W. B. Wing had in a load of hogs from Eugene.

John Kennedy brought in eight loads of cattle from Idaho Falls, Ida.

M. I. Yates brought in three loads of cattle from Echo.

Kidwell & Caswell brought in four loads of cattle from Malad, Idaho, and five loads from Blackfoot.

H. C. Strickland had in a load of horses from Caldwell, Idaho.

E. E. Willard shipped two loads of cattle and calves from Ontario, Ore.

Today's run of livestock compares with this day in recent years as follows: Hogs, Cattle, Sheep, Pigs, etc.

A year ago today there was a firm tone in livestock, with no change in prices.

# THE WHEAT MARKET

## CASH WHEAT FINDING FAVOR AND MOVES UP

Better Demand Comes From Minneapolis Millers With a Premium Over May; More Damage News Coming.

Damage in Kansas. Cincinnati, Ohio, Mar. 24.—Price Current says: "There is a widely prevailing need of moisture in the winter wheat belt, but the lack of it is retarding growth rather than causing any injury to the plant. Reports of winter killings are chiefly confined to Kansas, with all drawbacks considered, there is foundation for a winter wheat crop equal to or better than the average. Favorable progress being made in other agricultural features, spring sowing favorably in the northwest."

Chicago, Mar. 24.—Wheat opened and closed higher. July was the aggressor in the bull campaign today and showed the larger trading. Closing of the general market was 1-4 to 5-8c a bushel higher than yesterday.

Weakness at the start gave way to considerable firmness at Liverpool today. Opening there was 1-8d lower and the closing 1-8d to 7-8d higher than yesterday.

There was a somewhat improved demand for cash wheat from millers and at Minneapolis millers were paying 1 1-2 to 2 1-2c premium over the May for No. 1 northern.

## STIRS UP HORNET'S NEST.

Rabb David Levine of Spokane Says School Course in Moral Hygiene Is Failure.

Spokane, Wash.—Dr. David Levine, rabbi of Congregation Emanu-El, stirred up a veritable hornet's nest in Spokane when he branded the public school course in moral hygiene an absolute failure. He said the theory in sexology is that the social evil can be eradicated by knowledge, a modern instance of the old Socratic doctrine that knowledge and virtue are one, adding:

"This doctrine has come down through the centuries with a momentum but little short of irresistible—due, no doubt, to the magnificent moral career of Socrates, in whose life the doctrine was so luminously illustrated and seemingly vindicated. We should bear in mind, however, that this teaching was in reality but little more than an unconscious autobiographical disclosure, but not a principle of universal validity. It assumed a will like his own—one that would serve only his highest interests."

"The weakness of the theory was demonstrated in the career of Socrates' disciple, Alcibiades. Handsome and brilliant, this young Athenian was the philosopher's darling. To him Socrates imparted instruction lovingly and lavishly. And still Alcibiades became one of the most depraved specimens of citizenship that Athens ever produced. And why? Because Alcibiades, despite all his knowledge and ability, lacked a disciplined will."

Dr. Levine says that the Society for Social and Moral Hygiene would confer an unutterable blessing upon Spokane by the introduction of a system of will training in the schools and in

homes, instead of pandering to the child's craving for the mysterious and further appealing, in the old reprehensible fashion, to his fear or to his pride. Such training, he believes, would result in a marked diminution of all moral ills.
