Whether the woman was actually talked to death cannot be proved beyond a doubt, but her husband must have been convinced of the fact. Thomas Philip was a farmer and lived in East Fork township. He was educated and passed much of his time reading high grade books and magazines.

Some of his neighbors said he had

peculiar ways, and the women seemed to be of the opinion that his wife did not know much of the domestic side of life. She was advised to do this and do that.

One day she took sick and died within a short time. Her husband said the voluntary advice given his wife had worried her into sickness. After she was buried he caused the tombstone with the above inscription to be placed at the head of her grave.

TO URGE PROHIBITION.

Philadelphia Labor Union Would Put City "Dry" and Avenge Defeat.

Philadelphia, March 27.—Declaring the passage of a local option law would hasten the settlement of the trouble between the Philadelphia Rapid Transit company and its employees, the Central Labor Union at its meeting today adopted resolutions calling upon the members of the trades unions of this city to agitate and vote for local option at every opportunity.

The failure of the brewery workers to join the sympathetic strike, it is alleged, was practically responsible for the passage of this resolution. The day and may vote on a motion to table the resolution was 24 to 83. The general strike in sympathy with the car men which has been in effect for more than three weeks was officially called off at today's meeting. A majority of the workers who had returned to the call have already returned to work.

The committee of ten which had charge of the sympathetic strike made its report today and recommended that the strike be discontinued and financial support be given to the car men.
