### UMATILLA COUNTY SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION TO MEET

Fifteenth Annual Gathering Will Occur Next Tuesday and Wednesday—Three Sessions Daily—Prominent Workers Will Address Assemblage.

Pendleton is to be the scene of another convention next week and, although it will not bring such a large gathering to the city as did that of the Inland Empire Teachers' association, still preparations are being made for a large number of visitors. **Theater for Insane.**  
Washington, April 1.—A first class theater, seating 1200 with a stage large enough for grand opera, has been completed at the government hospital for the insane and is today ready for engagements. While outside attractions will be sought, it is the purpose of the management of the hospital to organize dramatic and operatic companies among the inmates and to give entertainments by the home talent regularly when other attractions cannot be secured.

**College at Port Arthur.**  
Tokio, April 1.—What was the principal Russian barracks at Port Arthur has been transformed into an industrial college and was formally opened today, with a Japanese faculty. The students are to be taken from the middle and high industrial schools, and the periods of study will be four years for the general course, two years for special courses. Electricity, mining, metallurgy and industry in general will be the main subjects in the curriculum.

### AT THE THEATER.

**"College Singing Girls."**  
Few entertainments of any kind ever presented in Pendleton have been so wholesomely entertaining and pleasing as "The College Singing Girls" at the Oregon last night under the auspices of the public school lecture course. There is not a weak member of the entire troupe and every number on the program was encored, some of them so often that the repertoire of encores was finally exhausted. Walter Eccles the impersonator, and Charles Pearsall, the accompanist and musical director, are the men for the positions.

It is impossible to pick out the best numbers for the entire program was one big hit and it is probable that had the choice of the most popular selection been left to a vote of the audience that every number on the program would have received some votes. The eight girls are literally "trained to the minute," while it is impossible to conceive of an accompanist who would be an improvement over Mr. Pearsall. The impersonator was probably at his best in "An Impatient Patient."

The girls were equally good alone or together in any kind of combinations, while jolly college songs or snatches from light operas and the still more classical grand opera numbers were rendered with equal facility. Innumerable changes of costume were effected without tiresome delays.

### "THE ALASKAN," TOTEM POLE MUSICAL COMEDY, IS COMING

An appropriate offering is the totem pole musical comedy, "The Alaskan," which comes to the Oregon Friday, April 15. The piece has been entirely revised and "musicalized" by Richard F. Carroll and Gus Weinburg, who have taken care, in the general revision, to equip themselves with strong comedy parts, so much so that now the laughter is incessant from rise to fall of curtain. Several new interpolations have been made, and the novel "snow-jalling" song, in which the audience is allowed to pet the Eskimo girls with fluffy white missiles creates no end of excitement. "Laughing Powder," "For I Dream of You," "Hi, Hi, Hi," and "The Face of the Girl I Love" are among the song hits.

Several new terpsichorean diversions have been added, and an entire general going over of everything makes "The Alaskan" a welcome visitor. The piece in its present form, it will be remembered, had a five-month run in Chicago, and was voted the best musical comedy exploited in many years.

Pays, filed a divorce suit in the Clackamas county circuit court Thursday afternoon, against Elizabeth Pays his wife. They are residents of Portland.

The plaintiff further alleges that his wife was over fond of the flowing bowl and that she drank to excess on various occasions, cursing him and making his life miserable. He was, he avers, obliged to leave her and went to Tacoma. On January 20, 1905, the plaintiff returned to Portland, and on his wife's promise to do better, he commenced to keep house with her again, as the complaint alleges, but again he was compelled to leave his home, because of his wife's drunkenness.

They were married at Portland, December 31, 1903.  
M. Alice Boothby commenced a divorce suit against her husband, Carlton F. Boothby, in the complaint she alleges that her husband, without her consent stayed over night with another woman at a rooming house at 350 1-2 Morrison street. They were married at Portland, February 27, 1909, and the plaintiff's name before her marriage was M. Alice Hamot.

John H. Hamilton commenced divorce proceedings against his wife Thursday after being married to her for 23 years. His cause for complaint as he alleges it was desertion. They were married at Roseburg, Ore., November 16, 1882.

M. for sprinkling the streets of the city of Pendleton, for the season of 1910, the districts to be sprinkled are as follows, viz:

**District No. 1.**  
All streets on the north side of the Umatilla River.

**District No. 2.**  
All streets on the south side of the Umatilla River, west of the east line of Main street, and north of the south line of Webb street.

**District No. 3.**  
All streets lying east of a line beginning at the intersection of the east line of Main street with the Umatilla river, thence following the east line of Main street to the south line of Webb street, thence following the south line of Webb street east to the west line of Vincent street, thence following the west line of Vincent street east to the north line of Bluff street, thence following the north line of Bluff street east, to the termination thereof, thence southerly to the City limits.

**District No. 4.**  
All streets south of the south line of Webb street, and west of the west line of Vincent street.

The City to furnish sprinklers, wagons and water, and the contractor to furnish horses, harness and driver, and to put up and take down all stand pipes etc. separate proposals will be received for each district, and no contract will be awarded to any one bidder for more than one district, the hours of sprinkling to be in accordance with the orders of the street committee, all bids shall specify the price per team and man per day of 10 hours, time when teams are not engaged in sprinkling to be deducted, the city reserves the right to reject any and all bids.
