

ONE HEIFER BREAKS ALL HIGH RECORDS

PRICE OF 1000 POUNDER ECLIPSES ALL PREVIOUS

One Animal from The Dalles Brings the Highest Quotation Ever Paid in Open Market in Northwest - Hog Market Slightly Weaker.

Portland Union Stockyards, March 31.—Only three head of cattle arrived in the yards during the past 24 hours and one of these brought the highest price ever paid in this market for a like animal.

The transaction was a single heifer and the price paid was \$7 per hundred pounds.

This sale would indicate that the market for real good steers would be as high as \$7 and perhaps more, if the quality was presented.

The trouble with the cattle market of late has been the lack of good stuff and were better quality offering, there is no doubt that all recent prices would have been elevated.

The two other cattle that arrived were sold at \$5, but they were extremely light.

Livestock Shipments Increased. Despite the small arrivals of livestock at this time, there was an increase in arrivals of the various grades during the month of March over the same month a year ago.

Total arrivals during the past month were 410. In view of the fact that March and April are always considered dull months for livestock movement, the showing is especially favorable.

The increase in the run of hogs during the month is due to the recent arrivals from Nebraska in the yards. "Information I have on hand," says D. O. Lively, general agent, "while not complete, shows that less hogs have been brought here from the east than during former years. This is due to the fact that Portland territory is growing. I have just returned from a trip through the interior on the demonstration train and find that more people are going into the hog business. I believe that within 18 months we will be getting five cars of hogs, where we are now getting a single load."

Hog Market Is Slightly Weaker. A slight degree of weakness is shown today in the local hog market and while general values are practically unchanged, buyers are bidding 10c to 15c less than a few days ago.

Henry G. Steffens had a mixed load of cattle and hogs from The Dalles on today's market.

E. J. Gloung brought in a load of sheep from Astington.

H. C. Hall shipped in 20 head of hogs on the steamer Mascot.

THE WHEAT MARKET

SNOW PREDICTS A SMALLER CROP OF WINTER WHEAT Estimates Kansas Condition at 67 Per Cent Compared With Government Report of 86 Per Cent Year Ago.

Chicago, Mar. 31.—Principal strength today was at the opening of the wheat market. Options closed 1-8 to 3-4c a bushel higher than yesterday.

Starting with a burst of strength that was induced by a goodly amount of short covering, May moved at a range from \$1.14 3-8 to \$1.15, as compared with yesterday's closing at \$1.14 1-8. July and September each showed 1-4c advance at the opening, with the start at \$1.08 5-8 for the July and \$1.05 5-8 to \$1.05 3-4 for the September.

Snow's report of the damaged condition of the crops caused some buying and short covering at the start. John Ingles wired from Odin, Ill., as follows: "Wheat is coming forward in good shape, exceeding expectations. Good rain last night."

Foreign markets continue to show a mixed feeling. Liverpool opened unchanged to 1-3d higher and closed 1-8d lower to 1-4d higher than yesterday. Paris closed 1-2 centime higher.

Wheat Market is Improving. Portland, Mar. 31.—Several sales of bluestem were made during the past 24 hours, and better prices were paid. One lot of good milling grain was sold to a miller at \$1.06 and nothing of that quality is being offered under \$1.05. One lot of poor bluestem was sold at \$1, but it was said to be no better than fortyfold.

California is not buying because of the rather firm holding by growers here. Practically all the late business in wheat has been of poor quality grain and this has been used as a bearish wedge by operators who wanted to force growers in line.

College Aero Convention. Philadelphia, April 1.—Budding aeronauts from colleges and universities all over the land are in attendance today at the first Intercollegiate Aeronautical convention at the University of Pennsylvania. Cornell and Columbia joined with the Quakers in arranging for the meeting, which is expected to result in the formation of a permanent organization of college aeronauts.

New Club in Atlanta. Atlanta, Ga., April 1.—Atlanta's newest social organization, the Atlanta Club, opens its elaborate quarters today and is expected to soon take rank as the leading club of the city.
