

### ANOTHER LIVESTOCK RECORD IS BROKEN

#### STEERS SELL IN PORTLAND YARDS AT TOPMOST PRICE

One Load Shipped by A. L. Demaris From Lowden Brings \$7 Per Cwt.—Other Lines Are Holding.

Portland Union Stockyards, Stockdale, April 1.—Seven dollars per hundred pounds was paid for steers today, breaking for all previous times, the high record for cattle in this market.

Only two loads of steers entered the yards today and both were shipped by the same party. The second load brought \$6.90. Considering the weight, this price was fully as good as the highest value.

The sale of sheep made late yesterday afternoon was at \$8.90, or the highest price ever obtained here.

One load of hogs arrived in today, but demand was not very brisk, and it was some time before the sale was made. Prices are generally unchanged, but are showing a tendency to drop, in sympathy with the eastern decline of the past few days.

Among the Shippers. A. L. Demaris shipped in two loads of steers from Lowden, Wash., that brought highest prices.

Kidwell & Caswell had in one load of hogs from Haines, Ore., on today's market.

### THE WHEAT MARKET

#### SHORT COVERING HELPS MAY WHEAT TO REMAIN FIRM

Advances Quarter Cent While Other Deliveries at Chicago Are Lower; Bad Weather in Germany.

#### World's Wheat Prices.

Table listing wheat prices from various locations like Portland, Chicago, St. Louis, Minneapolis, Duluth, Winnipeg, Liverpool, May 8 1/4; July 8 3/4 d.

Chicago, April 1.—Some short covering in the May was all that saved that option of wheat from showing a loss today, as did the other options.

Weakness was shown at most world's centers today. At Liverpool opening quotations were unchanged to 1-8 higher and the closing 1-8 to lower to 1-8 higher. Budapest showed a closing loss of 3-8c. Paris was up 1-2c for both wheat and flour, while Berlin held a gain of 3-4c, owing to the unfavorable weather for the growing crop in Germany.

There were no new developments in the home crop situation and this gave the market little chance to spread either way.
