Mrs. George B. Carrier has received word of the death of Mr. Carrier's father, Joseph Carrier, at his home in Hale, Michigan. Death occurred last Sunday morning, the day following the departure of Mr. Carrier from this city for the bedside of his father.

County Judge T. P. Gilliland of this city, has been appointed by Governor Benson as a delegate to the national conference of charities and corrections to be held in St. Louis, Mo., May 19-26. The other delegates from Oregon are Mrs. Letha W. Sifton, Mrs. Cornelia F. Rockwell, Mrs. Lola G. Baldwin, W. T. Gardner, Ben Selling, Thomas N. Strong, B. S. Pague, I. N. Fleischer, all of Portland; Mrs. Caroline Kellner, of Salem; Hon. Stephen Jewell of Grants Pass; Rev. C. E. Sanderson of Eugene.

Sells Meat Market—Buys Dairy.
Charles Tullis who has been engaged in the meat market business in this city for the past two years, has disposed of his interest in the Pendleton Cash market to his partner, L. B. Ramsdell, who will conduct the shop in future. Tullis has now closed a deal for the purchase of the famous Cheney dairy, including the land, buildings and stock and will take charge about the first of May. The transaction includes the sale of 40 head of jersey cows, said by a deputy dairy inspector to be the finest dairy herd in eastern Oregon.

He Wrote the Big G's.
Fritz Gannon, a card writer, is the gentleman who wrote the letter G on the doors of many Pendleton homes and he did so without any thought of inspiring fear in the hearts of the women or the children of the city. C. S. (Doc) Evans, proprietor of the Main street cigar store, has just received a letter from Gannon, who is now in Salem. Gannon is an old acquaintance of Evans and in his letter he explained that he lettered the houses to keep from visiting any places twice. He regards the matter as a good joke but hopes that no one has been unduly alarmed because of the letters.

Fighting Damage Suit.
A motion in the \$20,000 damage suit of Kearney versus the O. R. & N. is being argued at the court house today. This is the case in which Clarence Kearney, a former member of the police force is suing the railroad company for damages for physical and mental injuries sustained in falling from an O. R. & N. passenger train as it pulled into the local station last summer. Carter & Smythe as attorneys for the railroad company had filed a motion asking that the plaintiff be compelled to submit himself to an examination by a board of physicians to be appointed by the court. Attorneys Fee & Slater for Kearney are opposing this motion, holding that there is no law or precedent for it.

Indian Woman Wants Damages.
One of the most important cases to be called for trial at the first term of the federal court for eastern Oregon which will be convened here tomorrow is that of Minnie Joshua against the Northern Pacific company and in which she asks for damages. In the sum of \$15,000. Minnie Joshua is an Indian woman of 45 years who was injured in the train wreck which occurred on the Pendleton-Pasco branch of the Northern Pacific, north of this city in October of 1907. Her spine seems to have been permanently injured at that time. She had employed McCourt & Phelps as her attorneys and they brought suit in the local circuit court. The railroad secured a transfer to the federal court and it was supposed the case would be tried in Portland. Since that time the firm of McCourt & Phelps has been dissolved by reason of McCourt having been appointed United States Attorney eastern Oregon has been given a separate district of the federal court and the case has been sent back here for trial. Attorney Harrison Allen of Portland, will represent the railroad company.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS MEET TOMORROW

FIFTEENTH ANNUAL COUNTY CONVENTION WILL OPEN

More Than 100 Delegates Will be in Attendance at Two Day's Meeting—Three Sessions Daily—Music Will be Special Feature.

With more than 100 delegates in attendance the fifteenth annual convention of the Umatilla county Sunday school association, will be convened in this city tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock. The sessions of the convention will be held in the Methodist church on the corner of Webb and Johnson streets.

Eighteen of the 30 Sunday schools in the county outside of Pendleton have reported a total of 75 delegates while the 12 schools yet to hear from will bring the number to more than 100.
