POOR STUFF ONLY ARRIVALS IN YARDS

AS CONSEQUENCE PRICES PAID WERE NOT FANCY

Two Loads Form Total Arrivals for Open Market Over Sunday; 22 Loads of Sheep for Frye & Co.

Portland Union Stockyards, Stockdale, April 4.—While there were fair receipts of cattle in the yards over Sunday, only two loads were for this city, the remaining cars being for through shipment to the north.

Of the cattle that came, there was no really fancy goods offering, and nothing over \$6 was obtained.

Market for all livestock remains in a good position, with prices showing no change from last week.

Getting Sheep from California. Pacific northwest packers are getting practically all their sheep and lambs from California at this time, and therefore there is very little inducement to ship locally at the moment.

Cattle are so scarce in this market at this time that meat sellers have been compelled to bring in supplies of dressed beef from California.

Frank Hunt was an arrival late Saturday afternoon with 22 cars of sheep from California. The shipment came from Mendota, near Fresno and was en route to Frye & Co., at Seattle. The shipment is said to have been in good condition.

Charles Henry of Seattle had a cattle shipment over Sunday.

Among the Shippers. D. F. Walker came in with six loads of cattle and calves from Ontario, Ore., with six loads of cattle and calves for Seattle.

Bowman & Johnson had the only supplies on the market today. They shipped a mixed load of cattle and calves each from Durkee and Baker City, Ore.

THE WHEAT MARKET

ARMOUR AND PATTEN SELL WHEAT AND BRING DECLINE

Chicago Market Closes Lower and Depressed Conditions Are Shown Elsewhere; Cash Market Weaker.

World's Wheat Prices. Portland—Cash club, 96@97c; bluestem, \$1.06@1.07. Chicago—No. 2 red, \$1.13@1.20; May, \$1.13 3-4.

Chicago, April 4.—Wheat opened 1-3 to 5-8c lower and closed 1-2 to 3-4c a bushel under Saturday.

Weakness was shown on all sides. There were many reports regarding heavy selling by both Armour and Patten and this induced considerable liquidation of longs.

Foreign markets were weak and lower. At Liverpool there was a decline of 1-2d at the opening; closing was 1-4 to 3-8d under Saturday.

Cash wheat was generally lower and a loss of 1c was shown at Kansas City during the day.

The trading in May wheat was so very light today that it was almost impossible to execute an order at the quotations. The new business has now gone into the July and September options.

John Ingalls, the crop expert, wired: "The western counties of Indiana have very promising fields, but the majority of the fields show thin and cooler weather will stimulate stooling. Raining at Brunswick, Mo., and looks like rain at Kansas City."
