CATTLE ARE VERY DIFFICULT TO GET

STOCKMARKET AT PERIOD BETWEEN THE SEASONS

Shipments at Present Coming Principally from Montana and Portland Is Competing Successfully With Others.

Portland Union Stockyards, April 7.—There was a heavy run of cattle again in the yards today, one party bringing in 17 loads from Montana. Montana is the scene of the fight between the middle west and Pacific coast markets at the present time and the fact that Portland is drawing heavily upon the cattle of that section indicates that shippers are actually receiving more money by dealing with this city than with Omaha, Kansas City or St. Joseph.

At the present time the trade is standing between seasons. It is rather late for fed stuff and yet too early for grass cattle. Therefore the picking is light and high prices must be offered to induce shipments in any direction.

Good steers, and in fact all good cattle are extremely scarce and very hard to obtain, even at top prices.

Hogs are quoted firm, with small arrivals today, although a fair number put in an appearance yesterday. Sales are still being made at \$11@11.15.

Lambs Sell at \$9. Demand for good sheep is very firm, but little real top quality has been received in this market recently. Today's arrivals of sheep and lambs totaled 169 head. One sale of lambs was made at \$9, while sheep ruled at \$8 during the day. The latter averaged from 90 to 95 pounds, while the lambs went at close to 44 pounds.

Advices from the interior are to the effect that quite liberal shipments of sheep and lambs will be made to the local market within the next two weeks. Several shipments will come out of Prineville within that period.

Among the Shippers. Frank C. Sharkey came home from Montana with 17 loads of cattle. Fifteen loads were from Dillon and two loads from Red Rock.

J. C. Davis made his appearance from Shedd's, Or., with a mixed load of hogs and sheep today.

Another arrival from Shedd's was G. Berdick who came to the yards with a mixed load of cattle and calves.

J. S. Flint, the "regular" from Junction City renewed acquaintances in the stockyards today. He brought forward a load of sheep.

THE WHEAT MARKET

WHEAT ADVANCES AFTER OPENING WITH DECLINE

Chicago Market Had Loss of Three Quarters in May at Opening—Best Gains Made in the September.

Chicago, April 7.—Wheat market changed base today and closed 3-8 to 5-8c a bushel higher than yesterday. At the opening of the market this morning there was a strong disposition to sell wheat and in the May there was an initial loss of 3-4c a bushel. This was the only severe spell of weakness shown at the start. July being 1-8c lower and September unchanged as compared with yesterday's closing.

Increasing cloudiness was reported today through the entire middle west wheat belt and this gave the market its early weakness. Foreign markets were generally lower although Budapest held an advance of 1-4 at the closing. Liverpool opened 5-8d lower and closed with a loss of 1-8d from yesterday. Berlin was unchanged at the closing. Argentina shipments: Wheat 2,771,000 bushels, corn 40,000 bushels.

Washington, April 8.—Senator Bourne's plan to make it legal for homesteaders in semi-arid regions to remain off their claims, and require them to bring half the land under cultivation, has attracted attention in other states. He thus wrote to Senator Bourne: "Minneapolis Minn., March 21.—Dear Sir—I see you have introduced a new bill or measure in congress. I have read the letter you wrote to the Harney County News in February. I think that would be a grand good scheme; it would give so many a chance to get a farm where in the old way they never will be able to get one. I am included in this lot. I hope you will be able to get this through. For one you have my best wishes for your success and hope you will succeed. I belong to Minnesota, but next month I start for Oregon to make my future home. If I can make good I will locate in Burns. Hoping to hear more from the bill if you would kindly inform me. BRITONS FEAR ROOSEVELT WILL HIT THEM NEXT

London.—English politicians are apprehensive lest Roosevelt spring his next sensation on English soil. For publication, they conveniently express extreme pleasure over his coming visit May 16, but there is an ill-concealed fear that Roosevelt will lose another bolt here such as those he did at Khartoum, Cairo and Rome. Despite their anxiety political leaders and the people have the greatest admiration for Roosevelt's fearlessness. It is deemed significant that

Roosevelt's itinerary is so arranged that he will be in England during a critical political situation, when an election possible may be in progress. Few believe that the colonel will be able to refrain from voicing his sentiments in regard to the British politics and it is believed that expressions coming from him might do much toward influencing the outcome of the elections. It is recognized, however, that there is no use to try to prevent him from talking freely on whatever pleases him as a result the prevailing feeling of apprehensiveness in political anticipation as it is known that his opinions, publicly voiced, are certain to have far reaching consequences.

IS DRIVEN MAD BY A THREAT OF DEATH

Paris—"You are condemned to death," signed by the hand of an Apache, was the notice which a young workman received one day in a sealed envelope. The mysterious message had such an effect on his mind that it actually drove him mad, and worse than all, when he was released from an asylum after he had been cured, he enjoyed his freedom only a few days before he was stabbed to death, probably by the same hand that had written the threat.

A few years ago the young workman happened to make the acquaintance of some Apaches, who were then spending money freely, and who had invited him to share in their revels. He thus learned that the money was the proceeds of robbery and murder, and when he was arrested with the Apaches he told all he knew about the crime. He was acquitted as having had nothing to do with it, while the others were sentenced, but immediately after his release he received the above message. Having a very impressionable mind, he left the quarter and as he had to go through his military service at a place some distance from Paris, he felt safe for two years at least. But when he returned to Paris the same mysterious message was received. It drove him frantic and for some months he was taken care of in an asylum. At the end of that time he returned to Paris, but settled in a different quarter. The third day after his arrival he ventured out for a walk with a friend of his, and was standing in the street talking to him, when some one ran by and stabbed him with a stiletto near the heart. He fell down and died in a few minutes, while the murderer escaped in the darkness. The Apaches had carried out their threat of revenge.
