### NEWS OF THE NORTHWEST

**New Agent at Umatilla.**  
Umatilla, Ore.—J. S. Taylor of Heppner Junction has been appointed station agent here. Mr. Taylor was at one time chief dispatcher here, and was transferred to Heppner as agent.

**Tallest Skyscraper in Northwest.**  
Tacoma, Wash.—The National Realty building, now under construction, will have five additional stories added, by arrangement with the U. S. weather bureau, making it 21 stories high, the tallest building on the coast. The steel frame is already up to the sixth story.

**Walla Walla Wants Sunday.**  
Walla Walla, Wash.—Walla Walla ministers are preparing for a revival in this city this fall and a committee will see Billy Sunday April 17 in Bellingham to try to induce him to take charge of the meetings. An attempt was made to secure Gypsy Smith, but he has engagements in England. Henry Ostrom and W. F. Biederwolf are other evangelists under consideration.

**Apples Uninjured by Fake.**  
Hood River, Ore.—The Hood River Apple Growers' union Saturday received word from Steinhart & Kelly of New York, who bought the Hood River apple crop last year, that F. H. Letter & Co., of New York, who advertised yellow Newtons as Hood River apples and sold them at \$1.60 to \$1.90 per box are a very small firm and do not wield any influence among New York apple firms.

**Wireless for University.**  
University of Oregon, Eugene.—Thanks to two seniors' thesis work the university will soon be equipped with a first class wireless plant. James K. Nell and H. C. Inman, two engineering students, are building the

plant to count as their senior graduation work. Each student, before graduating, must do some senior work along the line of study on which he is majoring. Both Nell and Inman are electrical students and capable along these lines.

**152 Acres for \$23,000.**  
Silverton, Ore.—A land deal was consummated by the real estate firm of Anderson & Fry Friday when the Foick farm, consisting of 152 acres, located two miles west of this city, was sold to Theodore Johnson of Bellingsford, Neb., for \$23,000. This is said to be the biggest land deal that has been made in Silverton for many years. Mr. Johnson recently sold 1000 acres of land near Bellingsford for \$100 per acre. He will move his family to Silverton next fall, when he takes possession of the Silverton property.

**Roses for Roseburg.**  
Roseburg, Ore.—A shipment of 1000 rose bushes has just been received by the Roseburg Rose club, and are now being planted in all parts of the city. It is expected the another shipment of 2000 will be ordered soon.

The purpose of the Rose club is to make Roseburg the real rose city of Oregon. A favorite Roseburg rose will be chosen at a near future meeting of the club. It may be called the "Aaron Rose" in honor of Aaron Rose, the founder of Roseburg.

**Horses Pay \$3600 in Year.**  
Dayton, Wash.—Homer Samuel, a retired business man of Dayton, is the owner of two stallions and a jack, which this season will book him between \$3200 and \$3600. Mr. Samuel said that the bookings for last month exceeded \$800 while this month and in May they will total \$200.

He values the three animals at \$5600. His cost to keep them during the season of four months will total \$300, leaving a net profit exceeding \$3000. This may be reduced not to exceed \$300 by payment of insurance.

### CROWN PRINCE "STUNG."

**Makes Wildcat Speculation in Attempt to Emulate Leopold.**  
Berlin.—The crown prince of Germany is sad. Ambitious to become a great financier like the late King Leopold of the Belgians his royal highness took a little flyer in a wildcat American speculation which promised big things and if he was in Wall street instead of Under-den-Linden it might fairly be said he had been "stung."

The worst of it is, letters which are alleged to have been written by the crown prince to the man through whom he sought speculative wealth and which were used in court proceedings have been cabled back to Berlin. So the prince not only has had to suffer the financial loss, but his august father, who is referred to in the letters as "Big William," as well as everybody about the court knows of his misfortune and those who are highly enough placed to venture it are having no little sport with the royal speculator. His advice is asked on questions of finance and investment, particularly in regard to American securities and in various other ways a "friendly interest" in his misfortune is manifested.

It is a safe proposition to make that the next man who proposes an American speculation to the crown prince will hear some vigorous and unadorned German if nothing worse comes to him.

### FISH EAT HUMAN BEINGS.

**Snakes 85 Feet Long Found in Bolivia By Officer.**  
London.—Major P. H. Fawcett has just completed some explorations in Bolivia. Speaking of his experiences he says: "There are anacondas (giant snakes), crocodiles, electric eels, sting rays and the perania, a small deep-bodied fish with razor-like teeth and an unappeasable appetite for blood. Men unfortunate enough to fall into the Paraguay—where the perania is most prolific—may be picked clean before they can be rescued.

The anaconda is ubiquitous, moves

by night, and has a weird cry. The major's party killed one 65 feet long, and another party reported killing one 85 feet in length. Insects are legion and render life a torture. Mosquitoes are the least offensive. "In places one is covered from head to foot by bees, inside one's clothes and outside, in one's ears, nose, eyes, hair and mouth if it is opened, pungent-odored and reeking salt perspiration. Feeding by day under such circumstances is out of the question." There is a whole list of dreadful and obscure diseases, and the Brazil nut tree dropping its heavy fruit from 100 feet or 150 feet, often breaks the traveler's head. There is also a tree which drops a colorless liquid which causes the body to swell and gives acute pain."
