

LABOR FAMINE FACES WEST END OF COUNTY

500 MORE MEN NEEDED FOR DEVELOPMENT WORK

Stanfield Alone wants 250 More Laborers—\$100,000 Worth of Concrete Building Under Way—Immigrants Are Pouring In.

(Special Correspondence.) Stanfield, Ore., April 11.—The demand for labor in this part of Oregon so far outruns the available supply that 500 men could easily find employment at good wages at the present time. This condition has its origin mainly in the rapid development taking place in the West part of the county in the irrigated fruit districts about Hermiston and Stanfield. At this place alone 250 men will be needed this year to take care of newly planted orchard tracts. The great amount of improvement work and new construction just being begun on the O. R. & N. will still further increase the demand for labor and men who are looking for work at remunerative figures need have no hesitancy in making Stanfield their point of destination.

There is also a great deal of building activity at present, there being close to \$100,000 worth of concrete construction in the town in progress in addition to the large number of frame dwelling houses.

Immigration from the middle west continues more active than at any time heretofore, but most of the new comers are themselves employers of labor, in the development of their orchards and the building of their homes. Weather conditions are ideal with clear quiet and sunshiny days and warm nights and with an abundance of moisture to insure good crops in the lands above the ditches so that all things point to a most prosperous year for Stanfield and Umatilla county.



"In a few days psychologists will reduce to an exact science the method of composing advertisements so as to obtain the highest number of answers.

If the sensory impressions are vivid enough and compelling enough they cause the will center of the brain to act, thus forcing the reader to write and answer."

District No. 3.

All streets lying east of a line beginning at the intersection of the east line of Main street with the Umatilla River, thence following the east line of Main street to the south line of Webb street, thence following the south line of Webb street east to the west line of Vincent street, thence following the west line of Vincent street east to the north line of Bluff street, thence following the north line of Bluff street east, to the termination thereof, thence southerly to the city limits.

District No. 4.

All streets south of the south line of Webb street, and west of the west line of Vincent street.

The city to furnish sprinklers, wagons and water, and the contractor to furnish horses, harness and driver, and put up and take down all stand pipes, etc., separate proposals will be received for each district, and no contract will be awarded to any one bidder for more than one district, the hours of sprinkling to be in accordance with the orders of the street committee, all bids shall specify the price per team and man per day of 10 hours, time when teams are not engaged in sprinkling to be deducted.
