SHEEP ARE LOWER BUT HOGS ARE HIGHER

BETTER RUN BEARS DOWN SHEEP PRICES

Take Drop of 50 Cents While Hogs Shoot Up 15 Cents—Buyers Bearish and Do Not Take Hold Readily—Grass Cattle Arriving

Portland Union Stockyards, Stockdale, April 11.—Grass cattle from the south have started in this direction and one shipment of 10 loads is due from the south either this evening or tomorrow.

Cattle market is very firm and while the receipts over Sunday were light there was no change in quotations. The sale of the Montana "toppers" at \$7.25 Saturday has set a new record in the yards that will be hard to overtop for all interests say that such cattle have never before arrived at this or any other market of the Pacific coast.

There was some very ordinary cattle in the yards today and for these buyers would not pay within a fraction of former values although they seemed still willing to buy toppy stuff.

Bearing Down Sheep Prices.
With the better run of sheep as had been expected, there was a noticeable disinclination among buyers to take hold at former prices, and the figures accepted were generally about 50c lower than the former range. Practically all the sheep coming forward at this time are sheared, and therefore this will hereafter be the basis of quotations.

Advice received today from the interior are to the effect that heavy supplies will come in this direction at an early date. The fact that easterners are again contracting for sheep at interior points gives rise to the impression that values during the flush of the run will not go so low as usual.

Hogs Sell Higher Again.
An advance of 15c over previous prices was quoted for hogs today, with the sale of one lot of hogs over Sunday, a total of 701 head being received compared with none a week ago today.

Today's advance in the price of hogs here was made in the face of another decline in the east.

Hendin & Olinger came in from Nebraska points with 8 cars of hogs. S. B. Barker shipped in a load of sheep from Arlington.

S. W. Williams had a load of mixed hogs and sheep on today's market. W. I. Dishman supplied the market with two loads of California cattle. Chandler Bros. brought in two loads of fine stock sheep from Sheridan, Iowa, today.

Harry Boyd shipped in three loads of cattle from Idaho Falls, Idaho. J. A. Laycock sent in a load of cattle from Baker City.

THE WHEAT MARKET

SHARP BREAK IN NEW CROP WHEAT OPTIONS

Better Crop Weather in Central West and Northwest Adds to Bear Pressure—September Nearly 2c Lower.

Better Wheat Outlook.
St. Louis, Mo., April 11.—A good many reports from all parts of Illinois are showing the improvement in wheat prospects. Missouri is also sending in better reports.

Chicago, April 11.—Wheat broke heavily today and closed 7-8@1 7-8c a bushel lower than Saturday. To give the market such a setback there was plenty of news available, and even at the start quotations were 1-2@7-8c lower than yesterday. While none of the options received any support for there is no open bull leadership, pressure was slightest in the May, and it had the smallest loss for the day.

News of the growing crops was much more hopeful and shorts were induced to operate against the market and longs to liquidate.

At Kansas City there was heavy selling of the July option today, following the advice received from the field. Minneapolis advices were to the effect that weather conditions in the northwest were ideal, and that seeding will be completed within a few days.

Liverpool wheat market was inclined toward the bear side. Opening was 1-4 @ 3-8d lower, and the closing was down 1-8@3-8d from Saturday.
