Baseball Benefit Postponed.
"The Sultan's Daughter," the play which was to have been put on Tuesday evening by local talent for the benefit of the Pendleton baseball team, will not be presented until Friday evening, April 29.—The change of dates was made necessary by the Odd Fellows' excursion to Walla Walla, next Tuesday.

Carpet Cleaner Recovered.
Sheriff T. D. Taylor left this morning for Cutbank, Montana, to take into custody, Dave Myers who is wanted here to answer to the charge of stealing the carpet cleaning machine from his brother-in-law, Louis Carrell. The machine has been recovered and the officers have been after Myers for several days.

John D. Twoby Here.
John D. Twoby, another member of the contracting firm of Twoby Bros., arrived here last night to join his brother, Robert Twoby, who has been here for the past few days, personally directing the work preparatory to the rebuilding of the main line of the O. O. & N. between this city and Yamkum. Both men left for the camp at Pilot Rock Junction this morning.

Putting Up Extra Wires.
The Western Union Telegraph company now has a force of men at work out of this city installing an extra telegraph wire between Portland and Baker City. This installation of the new wire was made necessary by the increase in the amount of the local business in the eastern Oregon territory. The crew is now at work between Stanfield and Umatilla, but headquarters are maintained in this city.

NEW REQUEST TO THE NATION A MYSTERY

London.—The statement made by Mr. Harcourt in parliament as to a request to the nation of what he described as "one of the finest historical monuments in the country" has aroused widespread interest and curiosity.

Inquiries have thus far failed to throw any light on the identity of the "monument" referred to by Mr. Harcourt though various conjectures were hazarded. One authority suggested that the statement might refer to Richmond Castle, Yorkshire, which has just been handed over to the protection of his majesty's office of works. Another suggested Stonehenge or Battle Abbey—certainly relics of such historical interest that they ought, in his opinion, to be the property of the nation.

Among other buildings and monuments which, it was suggested in various quarters, might desirably belong to the nation—though most of them were obviously impossible as the object of Mr. Harcourt's statement—were the famous Wall of Antonine, which extends through so wide an area of England; the hut circles and other prehistoric remains on Dartmoor; the beautiful island of Iona, the birthplace of Christianity in these isles; Tintagel Castle and the castles of Warwick and Kenilworth.

It may not be generally known that no less than three separate Royal commissions are sitting just now to inquire into the question of the preservation of historical monuments, one commission being appointed for England, another for Scotland and the third for Wales, the members of the commission taking each country separately.

RUSSIA FORCES ODESSA TO BE FAIR TO THE JEWS

St. Petersburg, Thursday.—Minister of Finance Kokovosoff and the council of ministers have blocked a scheme of the reactionary organization of Odessa to gain control of the Odessa Municipal Credit association to the disadvantage of the Jewish beneficiaries.

Since the Jewish participants in the association, which makes loans on easy terms to Odessa citizens, have a working majority for the election of the board of directors, a plan of reorganization was adopted by the reactionary board of aldermen, separating the electors into two categories, according to religion, the Christian category, though numerically inferior, to elect a majority of the board.

General Tolmacheff, the prefect, indorsed the plan, but Kokovosoff refused his sanction, holding that political motives should not be introduced in an economic enterprise. In this he is sustained by the cabinet.
