### WOMAN'S VALUE IS \$200.

Court Allows Deserted Husband That Sum for Wife.

Chicago—Though judges have been known to award as much as \$10,000 for loss of a feminine arm, a jury in Judge Cleland's court allowed only \$200 for a whole woman. The woman's husband, Remi B. J. De Beule, a janitor, expressed satisfaction and said that was her full value. He had sued Charles Albrecht, a coal teamster, for alienation of affections. Neither Albrecht nor Mrs. De Beule was in court and it was explained that they had skipped out. "My wife and I came from Belgium many years ago," testified De Beule, "she was young and pretty, and we were happy until we took Albrecht to bed. In 1908 they eloped to Belgium. I followed and had them arrested. She came back, but remained only nine days. Again she eloped with Albrecht and again I took her back. She ran away five times and is gone for good now."

The jury retired and after a long deliberation decided that a woman who would elope with a teamster was worth no more than \$200. Afterward De Beule confided to a bystander that he didn't need the money but wanted to make his wife look as cheap as possible.

## ECHO TO SHIP GREAT QUANTITY OF WOOL

Echo, Ore., April 28.—Echo is now the center of attraction for all who deal in wool as the shearing season is at its height. The wool is coming to this place in great loads, weighing on an average of 7000 pounds. The warehouses at the Echo Wool Scouring Mills company are piling from the floor space to the rafters. Warehouse No. 1 is being held in reserve as long as possible for the heavy shipments that will come here from other points in Oregon and Washington. This vicinity will send in at least 1,500,000 pounds of wool.

The shearing plant is located at the old White House ranch. It has been taken over on the contract basis by Jake Wattenberger, who with 24 shearers and helpers is running the largest shearing plant in Oregon. All of this wool comes to Echo. Sixty-five hundred sheep will be clipped at this one point which will approximate 650,000 pounds.

The Echo Wool Scouring Mills company built here and had its first run last year. The prices paid here on the scoured basis last year were the highest in the state.

On Tuesday evening of this week there will be in the warehouse at Echo 400,000 pounds of wool. The wool is in the best of shape, and is much lighter than last year.

The April 23 issue of the Commercial Bulletin of Boston, Mass., says: "New clip wool is beginning to sell in eastern Oregon, according to the Oregonian, which says that a few small lots, aggregating about 20,000 pounds, have been sold recently at Echo on a basis of 14 to 16 1-2c a pound, or approximately 3 cents less than the same grades of wool sold at last season. After these preliminary purchases the buyers withdrew, and no further business was reported in that section."

The foregoing is erroneous, as there has been only one sale here this year. That was the Echo Wool Scouring Mills company. The company sold 10,000 pounds and received 18 1-2c. Echo is fast becoming an important wool market, and the town and vicinity are justly proud of the market. Buyers' day will be May 25.

### STEAMSHIP SERVICE TO COOS BAY IS IMPROVED

T. F. O'Brien, local agent for the O. R. & N., has received notice that the stamship service to Marshfield, Empire City, North Bend and other Coos Bay ports is to be improved early next month. The steamer "Breakwater," which was taken off the Coos Bay run a few weeks ago is to be put back on and beginning May 4 and every five days thereafter, the steamer will leave the Portland dock at 9 o'clock in the morning. This will give a daylight run down the Columbia river and will land the passengers in Coos Bay the following morn-

ing. Returning the steamer will leave Coos Bay on Friday, May 6 and every five days thereafter. The time of leaving Coos Bay will be determined by the tide.
