Steady quotations are generally shown for latest transactions, but the absence of arrivals makes it impossible to state definitely what the trend will be for the next shipments.

THE WHEAT MARKET

WHEAT LOWEST FOR TWO YEARS, OUT OF 3 CENT

Portland—Market Is Sharply Down and Dealers Say That They Scarcely Care to Buy—Fear Still Lower Figures.

Portland, April 27.—A further cut of 2c to 3c a bushel is shown today in the price of wheat here; this being the lowest figure the grain has been quoted at for about two years.

Nominal quotations for club today is \$4 and 85c a bushel, track delivery, and bluestem \$7c and 85c. Even at these figures buyers are not inclined to take hold, because they say they are afraid that the market will be under them in the next few days.

Severe cuts in wheat prices continue, not only at Liverpool, but Chicago has recently slid far below former quotations. Both of these have directly affected the local trade.

Flour trade is dull, with no change in prices. Walla Walla Wheat Wavers. Walla Walla, Wash., April 27.—Setting a new low price mark for the season on wheat, D. H. Cox yesterday purchased 10,000 bushels of Eureka Flat club for 72-1-2c. This is the lowest price that wheat has brought this year and little is changing hands at this quotation.

Slump in Chicago. Chicago, April 27.—A slump in wheat prices was shown at the opening of the market today, but with the exception of the May option a substantial recovery was made. Closing of May was 1-18c lower, while the July and September were 3-8 to 1-2c a bushel higher than yesterday.

May was weak all day, and owing to the loss in the cash price the future delivery was seriously affected during the day. Cash values are losing everywhere in the country. At Kansas City today there was a loss of 1-5-8c.

Liverpool gave the bear side its first lesson today by pulling the price of wheat 5-8c to 7-8c down at the opening. Closing it was 1-18@1-3-8c lower than yesterday.

There was a report that 30 per cent of the Kansas wheat acreage had been abandoned and this brought about the recovery in deferred options late in the day.

FIND FOSSIL AGES OLD. Asphalt Pit Gives Up Thigh of Elephant That Lived 200,000 Years Ago. Los Angeles.—The thigh bone of an imperial elephant, measuring forty-three inches in length and eleven inches in diameter at the lower end, has been excavated from the asphalt pit on the Rancho La Brea, near Sherman, Cal. This is one of the world's most marvelous fossils.

This animal lived during the Pliocene period and the fossil is probably 200,000 years old."
