

# GOOD STEERS HOLD FIRM IN STOCKDALE

### BUYERS STILL PAYING \$6.50 FOR BEST STUFF

Sale of California Stuff Brings Former Top and Some Cows Go at \$5.50—Same Price for Yearling Heifers.

Portland Union Stockyards, April 28.—There were arrivals of seven cars of cattle and one car of mixed stuff in the yards today and prices were well maintained. Four loads of cattle came in from Davis, California, and sold up to \$6.50 for steers and \$5.50 for cows. The steers averaged 1140 pounds and the cows 1165 pounds. The lot included heifers, which sold at \$5.50. These were yearlings.

William Harley came in from Huntington with four loads of cattle. G. D. Burdick had a load of cattle, calves and hogs offering from Salem today.

W. L. Dishman, the local shipper, brought forward three loads of cattle today. Today's run of livestock compares with this day in recent years as follows:

# THE WHEAT MARKET

## WHEAT LEADING OUT WELL IN THE DALLES COUNTRY

Prospects in Wasco County Never Better Than at Present—Fruit Crop So Heavy It Must Be Thinned.

Portland, April 28.—The Dalles cherry crop is said to have better prospects this season than ever before.

H. S. Rice, brother of George Rice the local commission merchant, who was in Portland from the Cherry City, said that the green cherries are so thick that nothing short of a miracle would stop that section from producing its best crop.

"Fruit blossoms," he says, "are heavier than ever before and unless weather conditions are unfavorable it will be necessary to thin out a large per cent of them because the trees will be unable to withstand the heavy loads of fruit when they mature."

The prospect for a bumper crop of grain in Wasco and surrounding territory, according to The Dalles man, were never better than at present. Some of the fall wheat is already heading out and shows the best condition in years.

### Kansas Damage News.

Chicago, April 28.—Wheat had a slight gain early but closed 3-8c to 5-8c a bushel lower than yesterday.

Among the trade there was a disposition to discount the information from Kansas telling of a big abandoned area and this brought out a loss of 1-1c in the opening of the July while the start of September was unchanged. Both options carried a loss of 5-8c at the closing of the market.

Showing the strength in the May option today was due to the reported buying of Patton. This had the effect of causing many of the "taller" to cover their shorts and in the meantime the May had advanced to \$1.05. Heaviness in the rest of the list carried the option down again and it closed 3-8c under yesterday.

Exceedingly bright prospects were shown at the opening of the Liverpool market today. Initial prices were 3-8d to 1-2d higher than yesterday's closing. The market began to show signs of easiness shortly after the opening closing 3/8d to 5/8d under yesterday.

## JUDGE GIVES FATHERLY ADVICE TO MAN AND WIFE

Rose, Idaho.—The supreme court of Idaho, a criterion on matrimonial entanglements, administered fatherly advice Friday when rendering its decision in the somewhat famous divorce suit of Judson Spofford vs. Julia R. Spofford of Lewiston, denying the plea of Judge Spofford for it stated, a little forbearance might correct the rupture between the two.

The decision affirms the denial of the district court in Lewiston to grant the petition of the genial colonel, who is widely known in the state of Idaho. He asked for a decree to cut the bonds of matrimony on the grounds that his wife had made him almost a nervous wreck by her hostile demonstrations and lectures, nagging and hectoring on account of what she deemed to be undue attentions by her husband toward other women.

The court says that the record submitted fails to show that the husband had been "criminally intimate with other women."

"If we were in the business of advising matrimonial discordants we would tell this aged and doubtless well-meaning couple, in our judgment, neither one is free from fault," remarked the court in a parental manner, "and that a mite of charity and a little forbearance and a portion of the courtesies and attentions they must have practiced in other times, mutually administered, would in their case adjust what is now only an aggravated case of jealousy induced by suspicious conduct."

## CONSUL TO CHEMNITZ HAS EYE FOR HOSIERY

Washington.—The state department always knew that Thomas H. Norton was a versatile sort of a fellow. He was born in New York and educated in Ohio. That's one reason he was given the post of consul at Chemnitz, Saxony. But not until his last report came in did Secretary Knox fully realize Norton's capacity for research or his powers of observation.

"Of late years there has been dissatisfaction over the liability of hosiery, especially the finer grades, to tear where the ordinary hose supporters are hooked or attached," says the consul to Chemnitz. "The complaints have increased as the old-fashioned garter has been steadily discarded for the more modern and hygienic supporter. Two new styles of Chemnitz hosiery have appeared, warranted free from defect. In the first design an additional 'arter welt' is knit about the top and forms a constituent part of the stocking four inches below the customary welt. The additional cost per dozen pair is 12 cents."

"A second design presents two broad loops on opposite sides of a stocking, starting five inches below the top. They are one inch wide and an inch and a half long, former during the operation of knitting and constitute an integral part of the stocking. Supporters can easily be attached to these loops, but the results of wear cannot extend to the stocking proper. The addition costs 16 2-3 cents per dozen pairs of hose."

Berlin.—The wonderful progress which is being made by Germany's airship fleet is shown by the announcement that four new dirigibles of the Parseval type are now being constructed at Bitterfeld. They will be named the Parseval VI, VII, VIII and IX, respectively. Parseval VI, which will be seventy-five yards long will have a diameter of thirteen yards and a capacity of 6700 cubic meters. It is to be sold to the Munich Aerial Navigation company, which will start airship cruises in and around Munich for passengers.
