

FOUR PENDLETON ATHLETES QUALIFY

LOCAL BOYS PLACE IN FIVE PRELIMINARY EVENTS

Boylan, Kimball and Gordon Each Take a First, and Gordon and Fee A Second Apiece—Spokane Leads With Ellensburg Second—Finals This Afternoon.

Four of Pendleton's five entries in the big inland Empire track meet at Walla Walla, qualified in yesterday's preliminaries and are contesting in the finals this afternoon. They are Boylen, Gordon, Fee and Kimball. These four men took three firsts and two seconds, Devine being the only man who failed to qualify.

Boylan made the best time in the mile, Kimball's time in the low hurdles was equal to the best made, Gordon won his heat in the 220 and won second in the 100, while Fee won a second in the high jump.

The track was heavy yesterday because of the recent rain, but is said to be in excellent condition this afternoon and it is expected that some inland empire interscholastic records will be smashed. The only record shattered yesterday was that of the 12-pound shotput when Jones of Baker City shot the lead on for a put of 45 feet, five inches.
