Secures Contract Yesterday in Contest With Four Other Bidders—Wins Only By Narrow Margin—Two Bids on Hermiton Bridge the Same.

By winning out in yesterday's bidding contest against four competitors, A. E. Eberhart, the bridge builder, has maintained his reputation of having secured the contract for the construction of every steel bridge erected in this county by the county court. His winning margin yesterday was one of the closest of any, two of the bids for the construction of the Hermiton bridge being for exactly the same amount.

The following are the bids on the Hermiton bridge, which will consist of but a single span:

Columbia Bridge company—\$5215, \$61.50 per altitude foot for concrete foundation and \$5 per lineal foot for concrete approaches.

SPECIAL TRAIN FOR ATHENA TRACK MEET

LARGE CROWD WILL PROBABLY SEE EVENT

Efforts Being Made to Secure Train to Accommodate 200 Local People—Athena Will Entertain Largest Crowd in History.

E. W. Brown of the high school faculty, and Secretary Ben Hill of the Commercial association are completing arrangements for a special train to be run to Athena next Saturday for the first big inter-scholastic field meet ever held for the schools of Umatilla county. The hours for the train will be announced later.

Local business men as well as members of the high school faculty and student body are interested in the event and it is probable that Athena will be called upon to entertain one of the largest crowds in her history. From the interest so far manifested it seems apparent that fully 200 people will go up from this city Milton to send down about 120, while Freewater, Weston, Helix, Adams, Pilot Rock, Echo, Stanfield, Hermiston and Umatilla will all be represented. The new city park at Athena has been equipped with a track and all arrangements are being made to entertain the visitors in the best manner possible. Principal Case of Athena is in the city today conferring with the local committee and he says that everything will be in readiness for the event.

He will be assisted by Rev. E. W. Warrington of Pilot Rock who went up to the east end of the county on the morning train. Rev. B. F. Harper, Presbyterian Sunday school missionary for eastern Oregon came down from Milton this morning on his way to Pilot Rock where he will occupy Warrington's pulpit tomorrow.

St. Elmo Delays Train.

The morning train to Spokane was delayed several minutes this morning by Belasco's St. Elmo company which is to appear in Pendleton tomorrow night. The company came in from the east last night and went to Walla Walla this morning, where the play is to be produced tonight. Owing to the large amount of scenery to be transferred it was impossible to get the train out on time. There was so much of the scenery and baggage that it was impossible to get it all into the baggage car and a part had to be placed in the mail car.

Mrs. Caroline Gillette Dies.

Mrs. Caroline Gillette, aged 70 years, died this morning about 7 o'clock at St. Anthony's hospital. Deceased was born in New York and was the mother of A. L. Parker of this city. Interment will be in Olney cemetery tomorrow afternoon. The funeral will be held at 2 o'clock at the Folsom undertaking parlors.

Lucius Allen Dies.

Lucius Allen, who has been residing at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Beers on McKay creek, died at St. Anthony's hospital this morning at the age of 77. He was born in Vermont and as a sailor traveled over a great portion of the earth's surface before settling down on the Umatilla county farm. The funeral services will be conducted tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Baker undertaking chapel by Rev. Nathan Evans, pastor of the Methodist church.

Districts Would Consolidate.

Residents of school districts No. 12 and 67 have petitioned the county boundary board to call an election for uniting the two districts. The order for the election was made today and notices will be posted. No. 67 is the one in which there has been so much strife recently between members of the board. No. 12 is known as the Bowlin district and the school building is about six miles northeast of Freewater. The building in the other district is up the Little Walla Walla river near the power plant.

Much Building Activity.

The building activity which has been very much in evidence during the past several weeks is still in progress. Charles Frazier is erecting a neat little cottage on his lots on West Webb street. W. S. Badley and George Ruzg are putting concrete walks in front of their West Court street residence properties. F. E. Tweedy is having the house which was yesterday moved from the post office site, fixed up on his east Pendleton property. Work is also being rushed on the Nesmith Ankeny residence on North Main street and other improvements started recently will soon be completed.
