

Washington.—The European starl-ing has been placed upon the list of obnoxious birds whose importation into this country is prohibited by the treasury department and the agri-cultural department, despite its atractive plumage and cheerful song. It has been found that the starling is very destructive to wheat and other grain crops. Introduced into New York it has spread through that state and southward to Pennsylvania, and it is feared that it will make its way into the western wheat belt where it would be a very unwelcome visitor.
