WESTON STUDENT DIES

SCHOOLS CLOSE OUT OF RESPECT TO DEAD BOY

Edgar Wutzer Passes Away in Walla Walla—Kirk Family Move to Sas Katchewan Country—Other News Notes of Normal Town.

Weston, Ore., May 6.—Edgar Wutzer, who died on Wednesday at the Walla Walla hospital of typhoid fever after but a few days' illness, was buried here yesterday. The schools were closed during the funeral out of respect for the deceased who was formerly a student. A very large concourse of friends and relatives were in attendance, and much sympathy is felt for the family in their bereavement.

BIG MIMIC BATTLE.

Many Red-men and White Will Put on Famous Indian Battle.

Spokane, Wash.—Eight hundred men, including 300 Indians from the Flathead, Nez Perce, Coeur d'Alene, Spokane, Yakima, Colville and Umatilla reservations, and 150 horses, will participate in the mimic battle of the Clearwater between Chief Joseph and his braves and Brigadier General O. O. Howard and the United States soldiers at the Spokane Interstate fair and International Dry Farming exposition in Spokane, October 3 to 8. The spectacle will be put on in the infield of the race track every evening during the week.

General Howard's thrilling description of the battle has been taken as the basis for the encounter and the various scenes from the preparation of the morning meal in the Indian camp to the victory of the soldiers, will be re-enacted by trained people and horses. This will include Captain Miller's spectacular charge, the taking of the commissary and spring by the redmen and the final attack, which resulted in the retreat and capture of the Indians.

The spectacle will be as true to history as possible under the personal direction of H. E. Gregory, superintendent of amusements of the Minnesota State fair, who will bring a crew of trained men to Spokane early in September to prepare for the big undertaking, which gives every promise of being interesting and instructive. The scene of Chief Joseph's first real fight, with General Howard, which took place near Lewiston, Idaho, will be reproduced on the grounds, where in addition to the participants in the battle will also be stage drivers and others who witnessed the historic encounter.

NEW POWER CO. TO HAVE TWO MANAGERS

AMERICAN CO. SUCCEEDS THE NORTHWESTERN

Walla Walla Will Be Headquarters of New Corporation—George O'Connor to Manage traction Holdings Only—Extensions Are Planned.

Says the Walla Walla Union: D. F. McGee, division superintendent of the American Power and Light Co., which has taken over the holdings of the Northwestern Corporation east of the mountains, has arrived in the city to take charge of the plants in this territory and will make his headquarters in Walla Walla. Permanent headquarters have not been definitely decided upon, it is said, but it is probable this city will be chosen.

Two managers are to have charge of the affairs of the company in this section, according to an announcement made yesterday. George O'Connor, who for several months has held the position as manager of the Northwestern corporation in this city, is retained to have charge of the traction holdings only. W. B. Forshaw of Wichita, Kansas, is to have charge of the gas and electric portion of the corporation, and arrived here last night.

The western plants which will undoubtedly be managed from Walla Walla are the Pendleton Gas & Electric; Lewiston Gas; Walla Walla Traction; Walla Walla Gas & Electric; the Yakima Gas; and the Astoria Gas. Mr. McGee says the various plants are to be developed to the fullest extent, the idea being to make them as profitable as possible. He says the promoters have unbounded faith in the west and will spend what money is necessary to put the properties in the best paying condition. Plans relative to betterments and extensions have not yet been decided upon definitely, but it is known that there are several propositions on foot.

The present company, it is understood is to be taken over in the near future by the proposed Columbia Power & Light company, which is to be greatly enlarged, while the transfer of the Strahorn electric plants and transmission lines in the Yakima valley is said to be all but consummated.

Guy W. Talbot, who is slated to be president of the Columbia company, in an interview given in Portland this week, is authority for the statement that the company will probably construct a transmission line between this city and Pasco, serving intermediate points. General headquarters of the company are to be maintained in Portland, while the head offices of the American concern are in New York city.

WASHINGTON D. D. MAKES HIMSELF "PUBLIC ADVISOR"

Washington.—With a wide range for the exercise of his talents the Rev. Zed H. Copp has installed himself as the "public advisor" of Washington. He has just completed a report of the first month of his service.

"Having a general knowledge of the law," he says, "and of the gospel, and special knowledge of dealing with delinquent children, I thought the range of my service should be broad enough to help all. Therefore my work embraces six points of the free service:

First—Legal advisor to those of limited circumstances.

Second—First aid to the unemployed.

Third—Mutual friend to the estranged.

Fourth—Spiritual guide to the non-churched.

Fifth—Lifesaver to the would-be suicide.

Sixth—Special counselor to parents of children with so-called incorrigible tendencies."

Public spirited lawyers have aided him with advice and have appeared in court when necessary. Rev. Copp consults seekers for aid two evenings every week, outside of his official time as chief probation officer. Last month he had 53 clients.

A number of the cases in which his assistance was solicited involved action for non-support, advice about incorrigible children, reunion of family and property rights, divorce, recovery of a child from the workhouse, action for slander, spiritual guidance, aid to enter the Methodist home of the aged and relief from impending prosecution. In nearly every case, he says, the desired relief was given.

EUROPEAN STARLING IS DENIED ENTRANCE TO U. S.

Washington.—The European starling has been placed upon the list of obnoxious birds whose importation into this country is prohibited by the treasury department and the agricultural department, despite its attractive plumage and cheerful song.

It has been found that the starling is very destructive to wheat and other grain crops. Introduced into New York it has spread through that state and southward to Pennsylvania, and it is feared that it will make its way into the western wheat belt where it would be a very unwelcome visitor. So the ban has been placed upon it and hereafter starlings imported into this country will face a horrible death at the hands of a customs collector.
