Albert O'Hara of the Reed and Hawley mountains, came down on a trading trip today.

Fred Dupois, one of the typhoid fever patients, has so far advanced on the road to recovery as to be able to take his outdoor airing daily. He is but a mere shadow of his former self but lives in anticipation of finally recovering his normal health and physical condition.

ADVANCED SOCIALIST IS NAMED A BISHOP

London.—It has been officially announced that Canon Hicks, bursar of Manchester Cathedral, has been appointed to succeed the late Dr. King as Bishop of Lincoln.

Canon Hicks may be regarded as the most advanced socialist to be chosen for a bishopric. There are two bishops at present who are claimed by some kinds of socialists as "comrades." They are: Dr. Gore, Bishop of Birmingham, who declared recently that the budget did not go far enough, and Dr. Stubbs, Bishop of Truro, a mild type of Christian Socialist, "after the fashion," as he says, "of Kingsley Maurice and Westcott."

Canon Hicks the new Episcopal "comrade," goes, however, considerably further in socialism than these. He presided, when acting as a diocesan missionary in the see which he is now to rule, over a socialist meeting at which he said:

"I have come to the conclusion that all the means of production and distribution of wealth, not only in this country, but throughout the world, should be in the hands of the people, to be used by the people for the people."

He practiced what he preached to an extent somewhat unusual with socialists, by determining that the revenues from certain investments which he held should be devoted to public purposes. He is a strong temperance advocate and an archaeologist of considerable repute.
