HOGS MAKE SLIGHT ADVANCE IN YARDS

PRICES RISE 5 CENTS FOLLOWING SMALL RUN

Only Shipment of Swine Brings \$10.65 at Stockdale—Steers Are Holding Steady at \$6.25.

Portland Union Stockyards, May 11.—An advance of 5c was quoted in the swine market here today. The fact that the eastern markets have been quite able to hold their own recently, has added to the local strength and one lot was sold in the Stockdale yards this morning at \$10.65 as compared with \$10.60 yesterday.

There was only a limited run of hogs in the yards today; not quite a car and therefore the demand was sufficient to bring the price to a higher notch.

It is a coincidence, too, that on this day, a year ago, there developed a firmer tone in the hog market and prices at that time had reached the highest mark of the season.

Best Steers Sell at \$6.25. There remains quite a good tone in the cattle market. Besides the stuff sold prior to arrival, 20 loads were sold this morning at the same price.

A drop of about 10c to -5c is shown in the market for sheep today in the stockyards. There were arrivals of 700 head for the day, four loads having come this morning from Roseburg.

Among the Shippers. Cattle—R. A. Robinson was in from Merced, Cal., with 16 loads of cattle, and Robinson Brothers had 10 loads from the same place.

Mixed stuff—J. C. Davis had a mixed load of hogs and sheep from Shedd; C. H. Farmer had a similar mixture from McCoy, Ore.

Sheep—Louis Burke shipped four loads from Roseburg.

THE WHEAT MARKET

ARMOUR COVERS AND WHEAT MOVES HIGHER

After Lower Opening There Is a General Advance in Chicago Pit.

Chicago, May 11.—With Armour's short covering the wheat market closed strong and generally higher after a bad spell of weakness. Closing was 1c higher for the May, unchanged for July and 1-4c higher for September as compared with yesterday.

When it became generally known that the provision king was really covering his short sales in the May, there was instant response from the "tallers." Short covering on an extensive scale was shown during one part of the session.

Foreign markets were weak and seriously depressed. Liverpool opened with a loss of 7-8d and closed 1-3-8 @ 1-2-2 under yesterday.

USE 1,250,000 FEET OF LUMBER IN FLUME

Wesler, Idaho.—A flume seven miles in length and requiring the use of 1,250,000 feet of lumber is being built to carry water to the Mesa orchards.

Of the 8000 acres in the project, 6000 will be devoted to apple orchards and 2000 to grapes, cherries, prunes, plums and such gardening as will be required to supply vegetables to the tract holders.

Ample water supply was near at hand. The middle fork of the Wesler river was within seven miles, but settlers had filed on most of the water supply. To meet the conditions a supply reservoir to furnish water to the Wesler river in lieu of what would be taken from Middle fork, was built 30 miles distant. This accomplished, the Middle fork was available for irrigation purposes and from which a water supply could be obtained.

Here a diversion dam has been built of concrete and steel and a flume seven miles in length is under construction from which 25 miles of laterals will distribute water to the orchards.

In the plans a small townsite has been located on a most beautiful commanding knoll, where orchard tract holders and no one else, may secure lots for home building; here, too, will be located a packing house and cold storage warehouse. From the townsite to the various districts of the orchard, electric tramways have been provided for, and from the power generated, which approximates 30-

LEONCAVALLO IS SORRY FOR JOKE TURNED ON HIMSELF

Milan.—Signor Leoncavallo, who is recovering from a dangerous illness, recounts an amusing experience that befell him some time ago in Manchester theater, where he occupied a stall one evening to hear the performance of his "Pagliacci." At the finale a stranger sitting near him kept exclaiming enthusiastically: "What a masterpiece! What a perfect masterpiece!"

Leoncavallo, imagining himself utterly unknown to the audience, thought it would be fine fun to play the critic of his own work, so chimed in ironically: "A masterpiece? I don't in the least agree with you, sir. I'm a musician myself, so know what I'm talking about. The fact is, this opera is a worthless production, and brimful of imitations and plagiarisms. For instance, that cavatina is fished bodily from Berlioz, the duet in the first act is all Gounod, while the finale is a sorry copy of one you will find in Verdi!"

Next morning Leoncavallo drove to the railway station and bought the leading local journal. On comfortably seating himself in the train he opened it, and was aghast with astonishment at encountering the following headlines: "Signor Leoncavallo's opinion on 'Pagliacci.' Declaration of plagiarism. Confession of a composer bereft of all originality." The great Italian master adds: "Evidently my neighbor was a journalist who had dogged me, but to this day I have cold shivers every time I recall the incident."
