### O. A. C. NOTES.

Plans for Quarter Centennial Taking Definite Shape.  
 Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore.—The plans for the great Quarter Centennial celebration at the Oregon Agricultural College are rapidly taking definite form. Four main committees with twenty sub-committees of the faculty have been organized and are now at work on the detailed arrangements.

President James H. Hamilton of the Montana Agricultural College will give the commencement address; Rev. Dr. F. W. Clappert, Rector of Trinity church, San Francisco, will preach the baccalaureate sermon, and Hon. W. F. Herrin, a graduate of the College with the class of 1873 and now head counsel for the Harriman railways, will deliver the principal address for the jubilee exercises.

The local and state alumni associations have made extensive plans for the entertainment of the returning graduates. Headquarters will be established on the campus for each of the classes. Monday, June 13, will be devoted largely to alumni affairs. The undergraduate organizations will also take an active part in the entertainment of the returning alumni. The climax of the celebration will fall on Tuesday, June 14. On this day the main anniversary exercises and the commencement exercises will be held. The special train from Portland and other points in the state will bring hundreds of visitors to the campus for the final exercises on this date.

## HUNDREDS ATTEND FIRST FREE CONCERT

PAVILION LAST NIGHT WAS FILLED WITH MUSIC LOVERS

Inauguration of Summer Concerts Proves Great Success—Fine Program of Musical Numbers—Concerts to be Held on Fridays Hereafter.

Several hundred people listened to and enjoyed the first of the series of concerts which was given in the fair pavilion last evening by the United Orchestra. The presence of so many people at the opening concert in the face of such a windy disagreeable evening testified in no uncertain way to the manner in which the citizens appreciate the efforts of Chairman Ingram of the music committee and of Director Frank Carruth and his musicians.

The program started promptly at 8 o'clock, having been preceded by a brief impromptu street concert which served to remind the forgetfully inclined of the evening event. Though the wind whistled and sang through the pavilion, causing shivers to run up and down the spines of those who were not dressed for winter, practically the entire throng remained until the close of the well rendered program.

The manner in which each of the numbers was applauded indicated that the orchestra has lost none of its popularity gained at the big poultry show in January. Future programs will be awaited with pleasurable anticipation. The concerts bid fair to prove a most popular innovation for the summer months, especially for those who will be unable to go to the sea shore of the mountains.

Chairman Ingram announced that hereafter the concerts will be given on Friday evening, and also that a special officer will be present to suppress the juvenile tendencies to convert the pavilion into a playground.
