

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
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

to the hospital and he remained senseless for 10 days. Then he began to recover, and a week ago was well enough to walk around the ward. He was able to talk of things that took place about him, but his mind was absolutely blank as to his name, his home or anything connected with his

Then he lost his power of speech, and since then had replied to all questions by a nod or shake of his head. A pad of paper and a pencil were given him yesterday afternoon, He looked at them blankly and then began to write. He formed letters and figures, but they had no meaning. Suddenly he looked puzzled for a moment, and then rapidly wrote: "My name is John Gable." He looked at the writing as if it were strange to him, crossed out the John and wrote "Otto."

That seemed to suit him, and a minute later added the figures. Then he made letters and figures for perhaps two minutes. Suddenly the pencil dropped from his hand and he fell back, unconscious. The doctors tried to revive him, but it was useless. He died an hour later.
