LOSS OF 10c MARKED DURING DAY'S SALES

Sales Are Not So Easily Made and Selected Quality Brings as High as \$10.55 and as Low as \$10.45.

Portland Union Stockyards, Stockdale, May 20.-The market for hogs is showing a tinge of weakness that really means a loss of 10c in price. Sales of swine were made in the Swamp-Root, the great kidney remedy, yards today from \$10.45 to \$10.55; one load going at the higher point and one at the lower figure. In a short time shipments will start from interior Oregon and then the California demand will be over. Until then it is not advisable to ship too much cattle to market because there is only just about so much call and when this is satisfied, as it has been of late, it is money out of the pockets of the shippers to send


