## WOULD DISPOSE OF UNALLOTTED LANDS

Bill by Senator Chamberlain Provides for Allotment and Sale of Lands on Umatilla Reservation.

The following bill which was introduced by Senator Chamberlain on May 5 has been referred to the committee on Indian affairs:

### A BILL

To authorize allotments and the sale and disposition of the surplus and unallotted lands in the Umatilla Indian reservation, in the state of Oregon, and making appropriation and provision to carry the same into effect.

Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the secretary of the interior be, and he is hereby authorized, and directed to cause to be surveyed, or resurveyed if necessary, all the lands within the limits of the Umatilla Indian reservation, in the state of Oregon, not heretofore surveyed, and to cause allotments to be made, under the provisions of the general allotment laws of the United States, to every man, woman, and child belonging to or holding tribal relations on said reservation who have not heretofore received allotments.

Section 2. That the secretary of the interior may reserve such lands as may be necessary for agency, school and religious purposes, to be reserved as long as needed and as long as agency, school or religious institutions are maintained thereon for the benefit of said Indians, and the said secretary is hereby authorized to set aside and reserve such lands for townsite purposes on the Umatilla reservation as in his opinion may be required for the future public interests, and he may cause the same to be surveyed into lots, blocks, streets and alleys and disposed of under such regulations as he may prescribe, in accordance with section twenty-three hundred and eighty-one of the United States revised statutes; and he is hereby authorized to set apart and reserve for school, park and other public purposes not more than ten acres in any town site, and patents shall be issued for the lands so set apart and reserved for school, park and other public purposes to the municipality legally charged with the care and custody of lands donated for such purposes. The purchase price of all town lots sold in such town sites, as hereinbefore provided, shall be paid at such times and in such installments as the secretary of the interior may direct, and he shall cause not more than twenty per centum of the proceeds arising from said sales to be set apart and expended under his direction in the construction of schoolhouses or in improvements in the town sites in which such lands are located. The net proceeds derived

from the sale of such lots within the town sites as aforesaid, less the amount set apart to aid in the construction of schoolhouses or other public buildings or improvements, shall be added to the funds derived from the sale of surplus lands as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 3. That the secretary of the interior is hereby authorized, in his discretion, to reserve from allotment, location, entry, or other disposition all lands within said Umatilla Indian reservation chiefly valuable for power sites and reservoir sites; Provided, That the said secretary be, and he is hereby authorized to cancel any allotments within any such power or reservoir site, after notice and hearing, which may be reserved as provided herein, the allottees of such canceled allotments to be reallocated and reimbursed for any improvements upon such canceled allotments, the value of such improvements to be determined under such rules and regulations as the secretary of the interior may prescribe; Provided further, that the secretary of the interior shall report to congress all power and reservoir sites set aside and reserved under the provisions of this act.

Sec. 4. That the special allotting agent designated to make the allotments provided for herein and the superintendent of the Umatilla Indian school shall constitute a commission to classify all of the lands remaining unallotted, unreserved and otherwise undisposed of. Said lands shall be classified into grazing lands and timber lands, and the secretary of the interior is hereby authorized to set aside and reserve the timber lands for the use of the Umatilla Indians as a tribal forest reserve, the timber thereon to be disposed of to said Indians for their domestic use under the direction of the commissioner of Indian affairs.

Sec. 5.—That the surplus lands shall be disposed of by proclamation, of the president, which proclamation shall describe the time when and the manner in which said lands shall be disposed of; Provided, that the lands shall be sold to the highest bidder for cash, with the right to reject any or all bids; Provided further, that not more than three hundred and twenty acres shall be sold to any one person; And provided further, that when any of the lands so sold shall have been paid for and the sale thereof shall have been approved by the secretary of the interior, a patent shall be issued to the purchaser thereof.

Sec. 6. That sections sixteen and thirty-six of each township within the Umatilla reservation shall not be subject to sale and the same are hereby granted to the state of Oregon for

school purposes, and in case any of said sections or parts thereof, are lost to said state by reason of allotments thereof to any Indian or Indians, or otherwise, the governor of said state, with the approval of the secretary of the interior, is hereby authorized to select other unoccupied, unreserved, nonmineral and nontimbered lands within said reservation in lieu thereof, not exceeding two sections in any one township, which selections must be made at least sixty days prior to the date fixed for the opening of the surplus lands; Provided, that the United States shall pay to said Indians for the lands in said sections sixteen and thirty-six, so granted, or the lands selected in lieu thereof, the sum of one dollar and twenty-five cents per acre.

Sec. 7. That the lands allotted, those retained or reserved, and the surplus lands sold, set aside for townsite purposes, or granted to the state or otherwise disposed of, shall be subject, for a period of twenty-five years, to all the laws of the United States prohibiting the introduction of intoxicants into the Indian country.

Sec. 8. That the proceeds received from the sale of said lands in conformity with this act, after deducting the expenses of making the allotments survey, appraisal, and classification, and sale of lands provided for herein, and such other incidental expenses as shall have been necessarily incurred, shall be paid into the treasury of the United States to the credit of said Indians, and shall draw interest at the rate of four per centum per annum, to be expended in the education and civilization of said Indians in such manner and at such times as, in the opinion of the secretary of the interior, may be for their best interest and welfare.

Sec. 9. That nothing in this act contained shall in any manner bind the United States to purchase any portion of the land herein described, except sections sixteen and thirty-six, or the equivalent, in each township, or to dispose of said land except as provided herein, or to guarantee to find purchasers for said lands or any portion thereof, it being the intention of this act that the United States shall act as trustee for said Indians to dispose of the said lands and to expend and pay over the proceeds received from the sale thereof only as received and as herein provided; Provided, that nothing in this act shall be construed to deprive the said Indians of the Umatilla Indian reservation of any benefits to which they are entitled under existing treaties or agreements not inconsistent with the provisions of this act.

Sec. 10. That there is hereby appropriated out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, the sum of twenty-four thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay for the lands granted to the state of Oregon for school purposes at the rate of one dollar and twenty-five cents per acre, and there is hereby appropriated a further sum of fifteen thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to

enable the secretary of the interior to survey, allot, classify and appraise, and sell the lands in said reservation as provided herein, the latter sum to be reimbursed out of funds arising from the sale of said lands.

Sec. 11.—That the secretary of the interior may make such rules and regulations as may be necessary to carry the provisions of this act into effect.
