

### KOEPPENS TO HAVE MORE FLOOR SPACE

DRUG STORE HAS SECURED AN ADDITIONAL BUILDING

Corner Store Room in Despain Building is Leased—Opening Will be Cut Between Two Rooms—Druggists Will Soon Celebrate Tenth Anniversary.

Arrangements have now been made by A. C. Koepfen & Bros., the drug store on Court street, with the owners of the Despain building, whereby they also have a lease for a number of years on the corner store room that they have been occupying under a temporary lease since last fall.

It is understood that this firm has a lease on their present locations that runs for over eight years from the present time, as at the time when they changed the front of the store building and put up the concrete addition in the rear covering a portion of the two store rooms, they took a lease for ten years, and now that a lease on the corner building is satisfactorily arranged, the contract has been let, and the contractors will proceed as rapidly as possible in making an opening between the two store rooms. A portion of the rock wall which separates the two store rooms will be removed, so that it will allow for an opening covering the greater portion of the space on the east side of their present store room, between the store front and where the soda fountain is located.

The front of the corner building will be changed. The present door, way leading into this building will be closed, and there will be only one opening, the main entrance, and the space used for the doorway in the corner room will be added to the store front for display purposes. With this additional space, which they have been in need of for some time, because of lack of room for properly displaying their different lines, and some new lines that will be added this fall, will certainly give them a most desirable store room, and make it the largest retail drug store in Eastern Oregon, and will number among the largest in the entire state.

Koepfens commenced business in Pendleton about ten years ago, and they state that they will celebrate their tenth business year anniversary in a most fitting manner, and just as soon as the necessary changes are made, announcements will appear that undoubtedly will be of interest to the public.

The Inland Distributing Company, which was to have been incorporated the first of the year, but because of several weeks of delay, caused by the illness of Mr. Koepfen at that time, made it too late for this firm to solicit the merchants for their regular fall and holiday business, and therefore has been operating only in a limited way since November, but will be incorporated in the near future, but will be incorporated at \$25,000.00 instead of \$20,000.00, as planned at that time, as a slight change in their business methods will necessitate this increase of capital, and their business field will be a little farther away from Pendleton for the present, but this is deemed necessary, as with the building of many new railroads in Oregon, which are now under way of construction, will make a more prosperous business territory near by, and this can be better organized a little later when they will be in position to know what amount of territory they will have to cover with this added new business territory brought about by the building of these new railroads.

The company will occupy office rooms in the back portion of the corner building for the present, with the main entrance on the side street, but will have an entrance from the main store into the office rooms, making it more convenient, as the two concerns will be under the management of A. C. Koepfen, until the wholesale and manufacturing part of the business has been brought up to a point where it will occupy the entire attention of one man.

Constantinople.—The grand vizier of Turkey has again proposed in the chamber that a fresh vote should be taken on the question of the annual grant to the six "damads" or husbands of the Imperial princesses. But the French lady determined to undergo it, despite her sex.

When the proper time arrived, on January 29 last, she was on the deck, striding about manlike, in a long fawn overcoat, a Panama hat and a pair of large sized deck shoes. In accordance with customs, she was seized, her face was duly lathered and shaved. She murmured no protest, and it was not until divested of her outer garments and dressed only in a bathing costume, she was toppled head over heels into a tank that the Oravia knew that a woman had for the first time shared the fate of man on a first voyage across the equator.

### I WIDOW FOR EVERY 2 FAMILIES IN TOWN

Topeka, Kan.—It is believed the new census will give Cedar Point a little town in Chase county, a distinction shown by no other village of like population in Kansas, or in the United States, for that matter. There are probably more widows to the number of families in Cedar Point than in any other village of 165 inhabitants in the country.

Twenty-seven families, not including the 16 widows, make up the population of this little Chase county town. In fact, Cedar Point is known as "the Town of Widows." The proportion is more than one widow for every two families.
