

BUYERS SEEK FOR CHEAPER LIVESTOCK

TENDENCY OF MARKET IS TO "TURN TURTLE"

Lower Prices in California Tend to Make Portland Buyers Bearish—Sheep Market Is Still Inactive.

Portland Union Stockyards, North Portland, Or., June 3.—While there was only a moderate run of livestock during the past 24 hours, more lines are showing an inclination to turn turtle. The weakness is most intent in hog transactions, although during the past 24 hours \$19.15 was obtained for one lot of extra select quality.

Sheep market prices are holding intact with \$6 still obtainable for fancy lambs. Sales at this price are again reported officially by sellers.

Weakness is again apparent in the cattle market. Lower prices in California have caused a similar notion to enter the heads of buyers here, and all are now clamoring for cheaper stuff, but better quality.

Among the shippers. Kiddie Bros., the well known eastern Oregon interests, had a load of hogs from Union and a load of cattle from La Grande.

George H. Jacobson was in with a load of cattle and hogs from The Dalles.

THE WHEAT MARKET

NEEDED RAINS HAVE EFFECT ON PRICES

Indian Shipments of Wheat Are Less Than Those of Year Ago—Range of Prices.

Chicago, June 4.—Bullishness gave way to short selling and the wheat market closed 1-4c to 1-8c and closed 1-2d to 1-4d under the close of yesterday. Rain in portions of the west country which needed moisture most contributed to the weakness here during the latter part of the season and had an influence upon the trade abroad.

Argentina shipments in bushels: Wheat, 560,000; corn, 1,292,000. Indian shipments of wheat, 1,072,000 bushels, compared with 1,608,000 bushels a year ago. Australian, 925,000 bushels, compared with 72,000 bushels.
