### COE DAM WORK PROGRESSING FAST

ESCHBAUGH, BRUCE & CO. OPEN UP THEIR CAMP

Low Stage of River Enables Work to Be Pushed on Big Furnish-Coe Dam—Contractors on Scene—Discharge Tunnel Is Completed.

(Special Correspondence.) Stanfield, Ore., June 12.—The Umatilla river having gotten to a stage low enough that work can be begun on the dam for the Furnish-Coe project by the contractors, things are beginning to hum at the siding at Coe, where the surplus waters of the project will be stored, and out of which after this season a continuous flow of water at low stage periods of the river may be turned into the Furnish ditch, maintaining "annual water" in the place of flood water for the project.

Mr. Marshall, superintendent of the Furnish Ditch company, has completed the discharge tunnel under the dam, dug down into the solid rock, with a concrete lining and a mass of concrete room, and this is already covered over its entire depth with earth and the whole enterprise has now been turned over to Messrs. Eschbaugh, Bruce & Co., the big Seattle contractors, for the completion of their part of the work.

This firm last week opened its camp and started in with a gang of thirty men, getting ready to build the trestle work on the upper and lower sides of the concrete core which crosses the river some feet above the surface of the ground at this time. From this trestle the earth will be dumped below, making the face and lower base of earth and rock with the concrete core going through the middle of the dam.

There will be 175,000 yards of earth to move. This earth will come out of the spillway or artificial river bed built 40 feet higher than the present river bed and through which the water will flow when the reservoir has been filled to within ten feet of the top of the dam, thus preventing any water from running over the dam. The water will, at low stages of the river, run through the discharge tunnel under the dam and at high stages will run over the spillway. The spillway will be lined with a solid concrete wall. The rock taken from the spillway will be used to cover the earthwork of the dam to a depth of six feet.

Eschbaugh, Bruce & Co., will handle this earth with steam shovels, removing 1500 yards of earth during the day time and 1000 yards at night and have a contract to complete the dam, under a \$25,000 bond, within ninety days after the work is under way.

This firm is now mixing concrete and getting ready for continuing the construction of the core of the dam while installing the machinery, tracks, steam shovels and engines for hauling earth.

This reservoir, when completed, will have one of the safest and best dam constructions in the whole west. It will be built precisely upon the plans of the government dam on the adjoining project, except that in the Coe dam the concrete core will not stop at the regular surface of the ground level, but will go clear through the dam to its top, and also has the advantage over most dams, in that its core is embedded in the solid rock at both sides and bottom.

**Other Notes.** The 21st Columbia Land company's special car arrived today with fifty people. They visited the work progressing at Coe on the Coe reservoir and expressed their praise regarding the dispatch with which the work is being put forward.

Contract was let this afternoon for the horticulturist's house on Dr. Coe's ranch in Section 11. Mr. George Anderson, the contractor, will begin work there tomorrow morning.

The well which was put down by Mr. Towers well drilling outfit on Mr. J. E. Faucett's place on Main street, is a great success. Soft water was struck at 66 feet water coming to within 12 feet of the surface of the ground. Mr. Faucett intends to put in a gasoline engine and supply some of the people nearest him.

Last night at a meeting of the church members of Stanfield and while organizing the church of Stanfield, Rev. Dr. R. I. Faucett was instructed to employ a missionary in India for the year following Mr. Faucett's return there, and money was raised at the meeting there last night to defray the salary of the church of Stanfield missionary for one year.

### DEATH OF CONVICT RECALLS BUTCHERY

Paris.—The announcement of the death at the French penal settlement in Guiana of the convict Briere recalls one of the most terrible butcheries in criminal history and also what in the opinion of many people was a grave judicial error. Briere had been in Guiana 10 years and it was announced only a few weeks ago that he was to be pardoned. The crime for which he was sentenced to death—the sentence was afterward commuted—was that of murdering his five children, the eldest of whom was 16.

The tragedy occurred in April, 1901, at Corancez a village near Chartres. Briere spent the evening

at the cafe, leaving his 16-year-old daughter, Clara, in charge of her brother and three sisters. In the early morning Briere was found outside his house groaning and complaining of injuries which he said had been inflicted on him by two individuals who attacked him as he was about to enter the house.

Inside the house the five children were found dead, horribly murdered by means of a knife and a ploughshare.

Briere's version was not believed and he was arrested on the charge of murdering the children, the alleged motive being that he wanted to rid himself of them in order to marry again. There was a sixth child, Germaine, who happened to be in Paris during imprisonment Briere never

consented to write to Germaine protesting his innocence and she fought harder than any one for a revision of the trial.

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
