# NEBRASKA HOGS IN PORTLAND YARDS

## SHIPMENTS FROM EAST WEAKEN THE MARKET

Seven Loads Brought Forward at Greater Cost Than Buyers Are Offering Locally—Cattle and Sheep Firm.

Portland Union Stockyards, North Portland, Or., June 13.—Weakness in the local hog market was again caused by the importation of fresh supplies of Nebraska hogs by local packers.

These hogs cost killers much more money than is being offered for the local product and while they may be somewhat better than the present offerings from the home territory, shippers are of the opinion that the difference in the cost is too heavy.

Encouragement of a substantial nature would give the local shipper a chance to see the error of his way in not putting out more hogs each season, but as long as killers continue to purchase the bulk of their supplies in the east and pay therefore a higher price than they give the local people, so long will such an unnatural condition, viz., shipments of Nebraska hogs to the Pacific northwest, continue.

While only seven loads were received from Nebraska today, this was practically all that came forward to the yards today, only 10 additional head being received this morning. The latter sold at \$9.50. This is considered the extreme top for local hogs at this time.

**Good Cattle Are Firm.**  
Good cattle are quoted firm in the local yards at this time and former top values are therefore easily maintained. Arrivals of cattle for the day were limited, but fancy cows sold up to \$4.75 and steers of like quality dollar. Today's sales of cows were dollar, but have brought an additional made at an advance of a dollar from the price in effect this day a year ago.

Market for calves showed small arrivals today, but some fancy light stuff sold up to \$6.75, or 25c better than the previous best.

Sheep and lambs are holding practically unchanged at former price range. Values are strong, however.

**Will Feed Stock Better.**  
It has been decided by local livestock interests to more thoroughly grade all arrivals in the yards hereafter. For instance there is a growing demand for a better class of stuff than is now offering and for those buyers are anxious to pay a premium over the ordinary run of stuff. Therefore the shipper and feeder of good cattle, hogs or sheep will get the extreme top of the market while what poor stuff may come forward will sell at what it is worth and not be put together with the better quality. This is in line with the practices in eastern yards and will bring the general average up.

That there will be better feeding of cattle the present season is now generally understood. The hay crop is far in excess of a year ago, when supplies became so short that feeders were either compelled to go out of business altogether or else limit their operations to a curtailed number. For instance the McCullough Brothers have over a thousand head of cattle on their summer range west of Echo just beyond lower Butter creek. This is the first time in four years there has been any feed for stock on this range during the summer. At one time thousands of head of stock grazed here until the feed was completely exhausted. But since the advent of the various irrigation ditches a new grass and various weeds have sprung up making the place once more a profitable feeding ground and bringing back a remembrance of the old days when stock raising was the sole industry in this vicinity.

**The Shippers.**  
Hentline & Olinger brought forward seven loads of hogs from Nebraska for the Union Meat company.  
E. Erickson shipped a mixed load of cattle and calves from Weiser, Idaho.

Burnett & Pike shipped a load of cattle and hogs from Buhl, Idaho.  
G. O. Vernon was in from Turner, Ore., with a mixed load of cattle and calves.

George Kehlhagen paid a flying visit to the yards from Roseburg. He had a load of sheep.  
E. E. Sherritt was in from Drain with a load of cattle.

## FLOW OF CALIFORNIA OIL GUSHER INCREASES

San Francisco.—After gushing for more than two years the past year at a steady, 1500-barrel clip, No. 1 well of the Palmer Oil company, in the Santa Maria fields, has suddenly begun to spout at a greatly increased rate and for several days has been producing 2000 barrels a day.

No. 2 well of the Palmer company, which came in as a gusher a couple of weeks ago, sanded up last week, but has been cleaned out and is now under control, being permitted to flow in such quantities as can be handled by the Union and Associated pipe lines.

News of the bringing in of another big gusher is momentarily expected from the Santa Maria fields, where the New Pennsylvania Oil company has just finished a well at 3555 feet. Fearing that the well will gush and get beyond control before storage facilities can be provided, water is being pumped into the well, but despite the 2500 foot column of water the gas pressure is so great that oil is being forced over the casing head at the rate of about 200 barrels a day. When the water pressure is removed it is expected that the well will start to gush at a terrific rate. The bringing in of this well is a very important development in the Santa Maria fields as it proves the productiveness of a large additional area.

The Union Oil company has just completed the building of a reservoir with a capacity of \$2,500,000 barrels and has begun the construction of an eastern reservoir, with a capacity of 6,000,000 barrels, six miles from the Lakeview gusher. This reservoir is to be built in a canyon and will be fortified against the inflow of the winter rains and excessive evaporation.
