GERMANY IS INDEPENDENT.

Statesman Argues She Might Starve Out Britain in War.

Berlin—Count Reventlow, argues that Great Britain has more to gain than Germany from the adoption of the principle of the inviolability of private property at sea in a naval war.

For, he says, Germany can, in case of need, feed herself from her own soil, and interference with the import of the raw materials of her industry would not to any great extent weaken her powers of resistance, while Great Britain is so largely dependent on foreign food that very slight losses would lead to a panic and a diminution of effective strength. The count concludes:

"England is fundamentally wrong in assuming that the abolition of the right of private prize could occasion Germany to build a less strong fleet than that which she is now constructing on the basis of an establishment fixed by law. The grounds for this are that, even after the abolition of the right of capture, our importation and exportation would be interrupted by the transformation of the North Sea into a great battlefield. In order to prevent this, German sea power must be so strong that even for England a war would appear hopeless from the outset.

"Further, we are not building a fleet merely for the protection of commerce, but also for the attainment of a political freedom of movement which, as the past has shown, we urgently need. That is true for questions of continental policy not less than for those of overseas policy, be they of a commercial or a colonial nature."

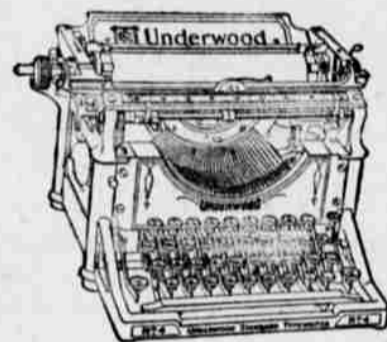
