STANFIELD MAKES PLANS FOR FOURTH

COMMITTEE OUTLINES PROGRAM OF THE DAY

Elaborate Preparations Made for Celebration of Independence Day—Ball Games, Buckaroo Contest and Sports of all kinds—Queen Will Be Elected.

(Special Correspondence.) Stanfield, Ore., June 17.—The Fourth of July committee met last evening and decided on the program for the Fourth of July. The program will consist of a ball game between Echo and Umatilla at 9:30, for a purse of \$50. Tug of war after the ball game. One contest between Echo and Hermiston and the other between Pendleton and Umatilla, each city getting up a tug of war team to contest here. These tugs of war contests will be for \$10 a side for each contestant. The committee decided to have the old fashioned greased pig contest, the pig to go to the catcher. In the afternoon at 1:30 Stanfield and Hermiston will cross bats for a purse of \$50 for the winner. Following will be a buckaroo contest, first prize of \$25 and second prize of \$15. There will be rope swinging exhibitions and all the other accoutrements of a wild west show.

After the buckaroo contest there will be three horse races. Half mile, free for all, first prize \$10 and second prize \$5. Pony race, half mile, first prize \$5 and second prize \$2.50, and the third race will be ladies' saddle horse, the prize to be \$5 toward a new hat. After supper sports will be pulled off. One hundred yard foot race, first prize of \$5 and second prize of \$2.50. Girls' race under 14 years, first prize \$2 and second prize \$1. Married women's race, first prize \$2 and second \$1. Boys' race, under fifteen years of age, \$2 to the winner. Three legged race, \$2 to the winner. Sack race, \$2 for a prize.

The committee has turned over concessions to C. C. Carr, who will make all arrangements and place concessionaires on the grounds. Mr. Carr will be glad to hear from any interested parties in regard to erecting booths and securing concessions either exclusive or general.

Several hundred dollars has been raised in Stanfield and to defray extra expenses a queen of the Stanfield carnival contest will be run. As a prize to the girl getting the most votes the committee will give a \$100 solitaire diamond ring, and each ticket cast for the contestants will entitle the voter to a chance on a \$30 gold watch, either ladies' or gentlemen's, depending on who the winner is. Voting will begin either Tuesday or Wednesday in all of the towns in some sort to be announced later and will continue until 6 o'clock on July 2. The contest will be finished and the votes finally counted at Stanfield from half past five to six o'clock on the fourth. Any votes which are not cast in any of the cities for the contestants may be placed in the ballot box at Stanfield. The queen will be enthroned after the sports at the dancing pavilion, where she will hold forth during the evening. The holder of the lucky coupon must be in the audience as the watch will be given to the lucky voter at the contest, after the votes have been counted and the coupon drawn by some child in the audience.

A huge dancing pavilion will be erected in the grove at the bank of the river, where dancing will be under the supervision of Messrs. Payne and Parker. The fireworks which will be used are being bought from the Paine Fire Works Co., of Chicago, and are the best fireworks which can be procured. These people make the fireworks used at the Oaks in Portland, and will be set off by an experienced hand.

STUDENTS BALK KAISER. Corps Answer Criticism of Beer-Drinking in Colleges. Berlin.—Hot debates are proceeding in the universities over the Kaiser's movement to check excessive beer drinking.

Though it is admitted the consumption of beer is not good training for the tropics, it takes more than the royal word to persuade the mass of students at Bonn, Heidelberg, Freiburg and elsewhere to accept the dictum that the Germans are at a disadvantage compared with Americans or Englishmen because of the immoderate tilting of the convivial horn. The drinking bouts, it is contended, combined with the strict code of etiquette observed in the various students' corps, really inculcate self-control and discipline. There is an absence of the milk-sop among German students, and taking them all around they can compete with those of any nation. So say their defenders. But the Kaiser's advice is having a moderating influence for all that.

The way to treat the insurgent members of congress, Dr. Coe says, is to keep them at home. Does he mean that only the faithful and rapidly diminishing "regulars" should be permitted to vote?
