Washington, D. C. Sir-I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of June enclosing a communication from George H. Root of Hermiston, Oregon, making inquiry as to the feasibility of introducing into the Umatilla irrigation project reservoir a natural food supply for the sustenance of the salmon trout therein contained. Fish of the Salmonide family subsist on live food, such as crustacea, mullusks, larvae of insects and other forms of acquatic animal life. It is thought the waters of the reservoir can be successfully stocked with the different species of crustacea native to the region including shrimp (Gammarus), and etomestraea of the genera Daphina, Ceriodaphina, Sida, Cyclops, Polyphenus and other forms which probably can be collected from local streams where they are indigenous by means of fine meshed nets or other appliances. Under normal conditions these forms will all multiply, some of them enermously. would also be well to liberally stock the lake with minnows, frogs, crawfish and such other forms of aquatic life as can be collected from adjacent waters or transferred from some of the larger rivers of the state. 
