Hindu Memorial Ceremony in Calcutta, Takes Practical Form.
Calcutta.—The Hindu demonstration in memory of King Edward closed with a peculiarly Hindu ceremony. Nearly 20,000 poor were fed, seated in two rows on either side of the public streets for over a mile.
The menu consisted of a delicious and sumptuous Bengalee dinner. The maharajah of Darbhanga acted as president and the dinner concluded with the gift of a piece of cloth to every person. The ceremony passed off without a hitch.
The chief justice and other prominent English residents visited the scene and the streets were crowded with tens of thousands of spectators. The poor dispersed, shouting "glory to the British rajah!"

HUSBAND HAS BUT FEW RIGHTS IN HOUSEHOLD

Pontiac, Mich.—One of the most unique documents ever seen in an Oakland court was introduced in the case of Thomas P. Bradford and wife of Grand Rapids, who are now the principals in a bill for accounting filed by the wife and being heard before Circuit Court Commissioner Matthews. Mrs. Bradford wants to know what he has done with \$25,000 of her money and the hearing has already occupied several weeks. The "bill of rights," which was introduced in testimony this morning was drawn up by Bradford before their marriage and contains these provisions:
Thomas P. Bradford agreed to allow Mrs. Bradford to visit wherever and whenever she desired and to take both children with her.
Mrs. Bradford was to have charge without interference, or all matters pertaining to the children.
She was to select the family physician.

Mrs. Bradford was to select the schools up to the time the children were 15, after which such matters were to be arranged by consultation.

Mrs. B. to select all servants and assistants.

Mrs. B. was allowed to have as many pictures of men and women, framed or unframed, in her room as she desired.

She was to sleep in a warm room, with the children if she liked.

Mrs. B. was to select her own guests when she entertained.

Mr. Bradford was not to keep any firearms in the house without permission of Mrs. Bradford.

He was not to walk through the house with snowy shoes or overshoes, nor leave his shoes on the tiling or near same, but was to keep them in a place approved by Mrs. B.

He was to refrain from all practical jokes and not to keep canvases on the back porch nor slats on the upper roof.

He was to remove college pictures from his room which were distasteful to Mrs. B.

He agreed to always treat his wife kindly.

When they were out together he was to look after his wife first.

He was to treat Mrs. B's friends nicely and courteously.

Bradford was to be allowed to go out evenings alone if he so desired.

He was not to request Mrs. Bradford to sell anything that was hers.
