# DOWIE BROTHER SAYS HE DISCOVERED BOTH POLES

Omaha, Neb.—Offering to submit their data to the proper authorities, "King" Dowie, brother of Alexander Dowie, who formed Zion City, and "Pope" Schrader, religious contemporaries, have laid claim to having discovered both the north and south Poles. "We are the only mortals who achieved that goal," said Dowie. In substance their itinerary was: Left New York for North Pole in three masted schooner May 3 1887. Reached the Pole April 12, 1889. Left no record because "nothing would stand where the pole is, owing to a lack of atmosphere. Finding the angels had not "short circuited them" on their return to New York, July 16, 1889, Dowie and Schrader set out 20 days later to discover the South Pole, which they came upon, they say, December 29, 1899. The same lack of atmosphere was discovered at the southern extremity of the earth. Satisfied with their results, they set sail for civilization and landed at Galveston, Texas, Dec. 29, 1899.
