My Dear Miss Boyd: I hope you will pardon my delay in reporting upon the greatest convention ever held by women, some five thousand strong.

Who says women cannot pull together? I only wish all women could go to University City to see for themselves. The half has not been told. They would need no urging to join the League.

"THE FATHERHOOD OF GOD."

While the quoted expression, or its equivalent may have been spoken many times on many occasions, it was the Rev. Edward Irving of Caledonian chapel, Cross street, London, whose utterance of the phrase led to a noticeable allusion to an English premier in the house of commons.

Irving was a Scotch preacher, a friend and correspondent of Carlyle, whose reputation as a Glasgow church orator had secured him the pastorate of the Caledonian chapel of Presbyterian worshippers in Cross street, Hatton garden, London.

It was Sir James Mackintosh who started the drift of official and society dignitaries in the direction of Irving's little chapel. For Sir James, on a certain Sunday, was struck by the pastor's relation in the morning prayer of the destitution which had recently befallen a family of children that suddenly lost its parental heads.

The relation closed with the phrase in the headline. All of these particulars Sir James gave to Premier George Canning. The head of the ministry was "startled" at the comprehensiveness of the quoted words and he resolved to attend Irving's preaching.

But the phrase which struck Mackintosh and startled Canning and which led to such great popularity of Irving was the preacher's pathetic statement that the homeless orphans were "thrown upon the fatherhood of God."—Edward Irving.
