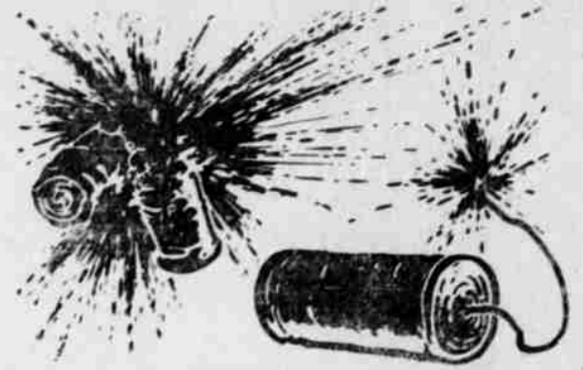

CONTEST IS ON FOR STANFIELD'S QUEEN

MUCH RIVALRY MANIFEST IN CELEBRATION ELECTION

Tickets Being Sold in Six Towns—Two Bands Will Be Hired on Fourth—Many Concessions Spoken for—Little Town Prepares for Big Crowd—Personal Items.

(Special Correspondence.) Stanfield, Ore., June 23.—The contest for queen of the Stanfield celebration held here on the Fourth of July is on in full swing. Tickets are being sold in Pendleton, Echo, Stanfield, Hermiston, Umatilla and Irrigon and the first bulletin will be published in the East Oregonian tomorrow. One of the aspirants for this honor in Hermiston told a member of the committee that it was not so much the \$100 solitaire ring she was after as it was to be the first queen of Stanfield. The rivalry for the highest number of votes in Stanfield has already become apparent. The contest is yet too young to enable the committee to tell which one is liable to be the lucky lady.

The committee has decided to engage both the Echo band and the Pendleton United Orchestra for the Fourth. The fireworks shipped from Chicago by the Payne Fire Works company for the celebration here, have arrived. The committee has been fortunate in being able to secure a competent and experienced man to take charge of the fire works during the evening of the Fourth so that no timidity need be felt by those who like to see fire works go off well and by those who are anxious lest some accident occur.

Concessions are being spoken for every day. Mr. C. C. Carr, who has charge of the concessions at the celebration is anxious to have all concessionaries who would care to come. The crowd which will be here on that day promises to make the celebration

here one of the largest ever held in the county, so that every person having concessions will be sure of getting good returns. Special trains run by the O. R. & N. will serve to bring extra people here.
