New Coach for O. A. C.
Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore., June 24.—The board of control officially announced yesterday the selection of George Childmiller of Dartmouth as the coach of the O. A. C. football team for the approaching season. Mr. Childmiller was chosen from a long list of candidates because of his excellent past record. The members of the board feel that they have been most fortunate in securing the services of Mr. Childmiller, as he is considered one of the strongest men in the country under the changed rules. Mr. Childmiller has played football for seven years. He began his football career at Andover, playing four years on the team of that school. He entered Dartmouth and played for three years on the strongest team in the history of the old school. During this period Dartmouth defeated Harvard twice, and played the third game a tie. After graduation Mr. Childmiller took command of the University of Maine football team and went through an arduous season with but two defeats against him.

Barney Mullin Gets Decision in Fight
OUT BOXES WALTER BURGO IN 15-ROUND CONTEST
"Clean Break" Fight Puts Handicap on La Grande Fighter—Latter Proved Game and Aggressive Throughout—A Regular Sponge for Punishment.
Barney Mullin of this city, welter-weight champion of the northwest, won a decision over Walter Burgo of Boston and La Grande in a 15-round boxing match at the Oregon theatre last evening. Jack Lyette of Echo, acted as referee. The decision of the official could not be questioned though Burgo yet believes he can defeat Mullin.
The match could not be described as a fast one for the reason that it was very slow, with the possible exception of a small part of two or three rounds. It was a "clean-break" fight and for that reason, Burgo with his shorter reach stood no show with his taller opponent. Mullin on the other hand, though able to rain blows without number all over the face of the La Grande fighter, was unable to land a knock-out.
Burgo seemed to realize that he could do nothing unless he was given a chance at close range and for that reason he did not strike more than five or six blows during the entire battle. Not more than two or three of these reached his opponent. Once he staggered Mullin, but the latter in turn battered him against the ropes and all around the ring without any serious effect. The more punishment he received the more he bored in for more and throughout the contest carried the fight to his opponent.
As a result of the match, a number of La Grande men are returning home today, sadder and poorer men, while Pendleton's fight fans are wealthier and happier than they have been for several days.
An effort is now being made to get these two men together for a bout at Stanfield on July Fourth. If the fight comes off, however, Burgo says it will not be a "clean break" fight.
Some preliminary bouts were pulled off last evening much to the amusement of the large audience. In one of these Smoke Turner took the count from Kid Williams, though it was clearly apparent that he permitted himself to be counted out for the reason that he was afraid he would get hurt.

STANFIELD TO GET BIG FIGHT RETURNS

SPECIAL WIRE TO BE CUT OUT ON THE FOURTH

Promoters of Jeff-Johnson Scrap Announce Arrangements Made With Stanfield Celebration Committee—Much Excitement Over Voting for Queen of the Fourth.

(Special Correspondence.)
Stanfield, June 24.—Telegraphic advice just received from the promoters of the Jeff-Johnson fight says that by a special agreement a special wire will be cut out at Stanfield so that the fight will be recorded by rounds and posted on a bulletin at the baseball grounds. The committee is much elated over this news.
Excitement in Stanfield over the first Fourth of July is at fever pitch. The money which has been subscribed already and which will be augmented by the sale of tickets for the queen of the celebration will, it is hoped, amply pay all the expenses to which the committee have been. Queries have been coming in to various members of the committee regarding the procedure in voting for queen, and the committee has issued this statement: The queen will be elected by a majority of votes and may live in any of the towns in which the contest is being carried on, and any girl or married woman is eligible to the contest. Votes are for sale in Pendleton in the Pendleton drug store, and Donaldson's drug store, in Echo in George & Miller's store, in Stanfield in Parker's and Hogard's stores, in Hermiston in Allen's pharmacy, in Unatilla in Brownell's store and in Irigen in The Leading Store. Voting will continue in each of these stores until 6 o'clock on July 2, after which time votes will be cast at Stanfield on the 4th of July up to 6 o'clock. The queen elected in this way will reign during the evening in customary legal splendor and as a souvenir from the committee will be given a hundred dollar solitaire diamond ring. Every voter retaining the coupon attached to the ballot is

entitled to a chance on a \$30 gold watch, either ladies or gentlemen's, depending on the sex of the winner. This coupon will be chosen at 6 o'clock on July 4 and announced at that time to the crowd. In case it is not immediately claimed two more tickets will be drawn. The number of the ticket first chosen will be advertised for one week, and in case the winner is not located in seven days the second coupon will be declared the winner and advertised for seven days, and in case the winner of the second coupon cannot be located the same mode of procedure shall be carried out for the third one chosen on the Fourth. The committee wants it especially understood the votes which are not cast in any of the cities before the evening of July 2 may be placed in the ballot box here in Stanfield. The queen will be enthroned after the sports have been pulled off. Her throne will be a raised platform in the dancing pavilion where she will hold court for the remainder of the evening. The coupons will be drawn from the ballot box by some child picked by the committee on the Fourth.
Arrangements are being made with the O. R. & N. officials and the committee is assured that special trains will be run both morning and evening, both east and west, for the celebration.

The committee in charge urges those coming that day to bring basket lunches, although assuring them at the same time that they can be amply taken care of and served at special eating places for the day.
Amusement places and picnic grounds will be allotted ample space and there will be plenty of room left in which the people may enjoy themselves without stepping on each others' feet.
Lots of shade and fun for everybody.
