

FALLING OFF IN CATTLE AND SHEEP

SELL AT LOWER PRICES IN PORTLAND YARDS

Heavy Receipts Are Shown in All Lines and Buyers Put Up Distress Flag—Best Lambs Go at \$5.75. Portland Union Stockyards, North

Portland, Ore., June 27.—With heavy arrivals in all lines there was weakness displayed in most prices on livestock today, although cattle and sheep were the leaders in showing the white feather.

Cattle prices dropped about 25c from Saturdays figures some very good local stuff selling at \$5.45 for steers, while cows went up to \$4.50. The run of cattle over Sunday consisted of 600 head, all but two loads of calves being from the home territory. The two loads of calves were from California and their sale was contracted a week ago at \$5.75 for the best.

Sheep Down 50 Cents. Sheep market dropped 50c in the yards today with ewes selling around \$4 as compared with former sales as high as \$4.50. Price of lambs dropped to \$5.75 for good stuff. This is 20c under the previous high mark. The yards were loaded with sheep and lambs today as killers wants are few at this time; naturally, packers flew the signal of distress and paid lower figures.

Worcester, Mass.—Although he had not seen his sister, who supposed him dead, for 38 years, William Venna, a hostler of San Mateo, Cal., was able to prove himself the only heir to her \$25,000 estate, and Judge William T. Farber of the probate court, allowed his claim. The estate involved was that of Mrs. Jennie S. Miller, of Athol, who died on July 2, 1908, leaving no known heirs. The court appointed a public administrator to take charge of the estate, but recently a stranger appeared and entered a claim to the property. In his petition he described himself as William Venna, otherwise known as William McVenna and William McAlvaine. Venna and his sister were born in Ireland and both came to this country before the civil war. Venna worked as a hostler in Boston until the war, when he enlisted, and his sister later went to New York, where he last saw her in 1872. Venna removed to California, and the sister married an Athol man.
