## DOCTOR SATIRIZES JURY.

### Characteristic Incident in French Medical School.

Paris.—The medical students who have been excluded from the French school of medicine by the police are expressing by means of eggs and tomatoes, their objections to the present system of electing candidates to the faculty of medicine, have had their revenge.

Dr. Berillon, one of the principal objectors, presented himself as a candidate, and devoted a greater part of his thesis to a brilliant satire on certain features of medical instruction in France, to be practical "excitation of muscular rheumatism," the theme allotted to him as a subject.

The candidate began by stating there were two kinds of doctors, and entered upon a very thinly veiled attack upon the dean, M. Landouzy, and the jury. It soon became too much for the dean, who tartly reminded the candidate that he had not yet mentioned "muscular rheumatism."

"Oh, yes," was the reply. "I am going to treat it in text-book form." And without a smile, he presented in the most abstruse medical terminology, a ridiculous account of how cutlers, being obliged while working to stoop in a stream of water to sharpen their tools were subject to rheumatism, and evaded it by tying long-handled paddles to the calves of their legs.

"The cutlers catch fleas from the dogs," Dr. Berillon added gravely, while the lecture room rocked with laughter, "but it is claimed that the fleas draw the rheumatism out of their masters."

Dr. Berillon proceeded to say that certain doctors preferred to send their patients to hot springs—a transparent reference to M. Landouzy's favorite treatment, which made the dean writhe, while a nervous member of the jury in scarlet robes shuffled uneasily with his feet. "Muscular rheumatism," the candidate quickly observed, "has also a certain moral effect. Patients become irritable and cannot keep their feet still." The audience roared.

The situation was unendurable and the jury fled out, while M. Landouzy, rising angrily, announced that the candidate's name was struck from the list.

## NEWS OF THE NORTHWEST

### Confesses Stealing Bicycles.

Walla Walla, Wash.—Harry Hoffman, the 14-year-old lad who has been causing bicycle riders of this city much uneasiness for the past three weeks, has been apprehended, and several stolen wheels recovered. The boy confessed his crimes, and may be sent to the reform school, and if not he will be put on probation.

### Killing Near McMinnville.

McMinnville, Ore.—Wright Clark was shot and killed by Ples Fisher, near Halston, 15 miles southwest of here, between 3 and 4 o'clock Monday afternoon, as the result of Fisher's suspicion that undue intimacy existed between Clark and Fisher's wife. It is reported here that Fisher found Clark and Mrs. Fisher together and shot Clark on sight, once in the head and once in the back. Death was instantaneous. Other details of the killing are lacking.

### Boys' Summer Camp.

Aberdeen, Wash.—After having violated his parole, Hart, the young man who was arrested for committing burglary in entering the store of the Grays Harbor Commercial company at Cosmopolis, was taken to the state penitentiary at Walla Walla. Evidence appeared against the prisoner which showed that he had made his escape from the penitentiary after having nearly finished his term of five years, which he will now have to finish. He is about 22 years old. A few days ago he came to Aberdeen and showed Sheriff Payette where he had hidden the goods he stole at Cosmopolis.

### Boys' Summer Camp.

Aberdeen, Wash.—A meeting for considering the details of the proposed Aberdeen boys' summer camp on the beach below Westport this year, was held in the city hall Sunday, when plans were discussed and applications received. The nucleus of the needed fund has been raised, and the camp has been laid out, and the contract given for sinking an artesian well at the proposed location, and work on the camp grounds has been begun. The grounds are well located along the ocean beach about two miles south of Cosmopolis, and are well protected behind sand dunes, but easily accessible to the ocean.

### Wild Berries Kill Child.

Seattle, Wash.—Poisoned by eating wild berries little Eugenie Campagni, 8-years-old, died at her parents home Sunday. Norman and Roy Boetney, aged 9 and 7, respectively, have been in a serious condition and are just recovering, and four other children were made sick by eating berries in the same patch. The children ate the berries last Wednesday and felt a trace of stomach trouble but not suspecting the fruit, they visited the patch in the north end of this city again the following day. Friday all were sick. Sunday morning the campagni girl's condition became serious and medical aid was summoned. She died in convulsions.

### Forest Fire Damages.

Marshallfield, Ore.—A fire in the logging camp of the Cady Lumber company on the Coquille river, has done considerable damage. The fire was brought under control but the logs which are now being taken out of the timber show the damage the fire did. There have been several forest fires this year but this one was the most
