### SEEKS HITTITE HISTORY.

San Francisco Scientist Plans an Expedition to Asia Minor Shortly.

New York.—Professor William F. Bade, head of the semitic department of the Pacific Theological Seminary, arrived on the steamer President Lincoln Thursday afternoon, and is staying at the Hotel Navarree. This is his second visit to this country in two months, he having traveled from England to Washington a few months ago to voice his objections to the acquisition of Hetch Hetchy valley on the ground that popularity of visitor sports in the valley would bring thousands there, and there was a danger of polluting the water to be used by San Francisco.

Instead of returning immediately to San Francisco Professor Bade intends doing some editorial work for the Independent, a scientific publication. This will occupy six weeks of his time when he will return to the West for the purpose of arranging an expedition into Asia Minor for the purpose of digging for data pertaining to the Hittites.

"I have been making a little preparation for the prospective tour," said Professor Bade. "We hope to go five or six weeks within the next year or two. Friends of mine will finance the expedition. We will excavate in order to find the key to the inscriptions of the Hittites."

### LEAVE WALLA WALLA FORT.

Order From War Department Has Been Made Regarding the Old Post.

Walla Walla, Wash.—Fort Walla Walla has been officially abandoned, and the troops are to be moved to Boise barracks this fall, according to reliable information received here from Washington, D. C. The order of abandonment was approved by President Taft on recommendation of the general staff and Secretary of War Dickinson. Bids for the new \$100,000 barracks were opened at Boise June 8, and work is now under way. It is probable that when troops A, B, C and D, First Cavalry, leave here for American Lake, they will leave forever.

The post was established in the fall of 1856, under command of Lieutenant Colonel E. J. Steptoe. The cause of abandonment variously is said to be the general policy of the War Department in giving up the inland forts, and the efforts of Whitman College to get the ground. However, the abandonment does not necessarily mean the smoke will get the land, although it makes a fight for the troops, but they were ordered to Boise. Officers are of the opinion the troops will not leave until spring.

### HARVEST BEGINS NEAR LEWISTON AT EARLY DATE

Lewiston, Idaho.—Harvesting in the Lewiston country has just begun, and authorities state that it is the earliest in many years that grain has reached this condition this early in the season. The first combine harvester to begin operations started Wednesday on the 2500 acre farm of W. S. Houser, west of Clarkston, in Asotin county. Reports received from that section state that fall-sown barley and wheat are in splendid condition and will yield heavily though crops were damaged to some extent by lack of moisture and warm winds.

Spring sown grain is not in the best of condition, according to reports, but it is estimated that the crop will be bountiful. The Houser farm consists of about 1400 acres of wheat while barley crop makes up the balance of the acreage.

Mr. Houser stated that the yield through Asotin county of all grains will be equally as heavy as last year. Threshing district threshing has not yet started, but many binders are now cutting grain and information is available that combined harvesters will move through lower Tammammy during the coming week.

Reports from all sections of the Lewiston country indicate that rain is needed. The fall-sown grain is reported to be in fine shape, and with much needed rain nothing can prevent the harvesting of a crop this year that will equal last year's.

### COUNTY AUDITOR CALLS MARRIAGE LAW A FARCE

Walla Walla, Wash.—After choosing Spokane for the next meeting place and electing Auditor Robert Butler of Spokane president of the association, the county auditors of the state adjourned Thursday night after one of the most successful meetings ever held.

The feature of the last session was a hostile criticism of the marriage laws by M. B. Kies of Vancouver, who made recommendations along this line. He said the present law drives business from the counties on the state border and produces no beneficial results. He called the present law a howling farce, and recommended it be repealed and a new one passed containing the compulsory medical examination clause, but providing the county should pay the physicians instead of the applicant as is the case under the present law.
