COUNTY AUDITOR CALLS MARRIAGE LAW A FARCE

Walla Walla, Wash.—After choosplace and electing Auditor Robert Butler of Spokane president of the association, the county auditors of the state adjourned Thursday night ifter one of the most successful meet-The feature of the last session was

caustic criticism of the marriage nws by M. B. Kles of Vancouver. who made recommendations along this line. He said the present law drives business from the counties or the state border and produces no beneficial results. He called the present law a howling farce, and recommended it be repealed and a new one passed containing the compul-sory medical examination clause, but providing the county should pay the physicians instead of the applicant as is the case under the present law.

Under the existing law the appllant swears to his condition, and Kies says the applicant doesn't know anything about it, and wouldn't say so if he did. Kies would make it the duty of the county health officer to look after the examination of applicants, and put him on a salary, or allow him a fixed fee, paid by the cunty.

Also, to aid in maintenance of the official, license fees should be fixed at no less than \$5.

Summing up the whole thing, he ecommended the repeal of the present marriage law and a return to the law which was in force prior to June 10, 1909, with the age limit for girls
