

# ECHO DESERTED ON THE FOURTH

#### Floating Hospital for Poor.

New York, July 5.—With the coming of hot weather the discomforts in the congested parts of the city are keenly felt by sick children and their mothers, to relieve which St. John's Guild has already begun its work. It will operate a seaside hospital at New Dorp Beach, S. I., and a floating hospital plying between the city and the beach.

Every day except Sunday the mothers and ailing children from the crowded districts will be met at the hospital at New Ferry and taken to the hospital at New Dorp Beach. A baby in arms or a sick child is a ticket for the whole family. Everything is free.

The floating hospital made its first trip today.

The department of docks and ferries has given the hospital permission to land at the various recreation piers. The New York Dock company, the Brooklyn Union Gas company and the A. E. Outerbridge company, have given similar privileges for the docks controlled by them.
