THE ONLY SOLUTION.

Voters of Oregon will be compelled to pass upon 32 legislative measures when they vote this fall.

Conspicuous in this class are the eight county division bills that have been filed. Each of these measures pertains to an issue that is strictly local in character.

Now what is the poor voter to do? In the view of the East Oregonian there is but one logical way to settle county division problems.

In order to hold these division measures until they can be settled with a proper degree of intelligence it will be necessary to vote down the initiative bills that have been filed.
