## IRRIGATION CONGRESS WILL BE IMPORTANT

### NEXT SESSION WILL ECLIPSE ALL PREVIOUS

Many Prominent Speakers on Five-Day Program—Many Features of Irrigation Will Be Discussed by Authorities.

Spokane, Wash.—Arthur Hooker, secretary of the 18th National Irrigation congress, says in a letter to the Spokane chamber of commerce, that the convention at Pueblo, Colo., September 28 to 30, gives promise of being the most interesting in the history of the organization. Among the speakers will be representatives from various parts of the northwest where irrigation is practiced. Dr. E. McQueen Gray, foreign secretary, reports that foreign countries will be represented by delegates.

The opening exercises are scheduled for the morning of September 28, when an industrial parade will move through the principal streets as a prelude to the national irrigation exposition. R. Insinger of Spokane, chairman of the board of governors, will call the congress to order at 2 o'clock in the afternoon and introduce P. J. Dugan, chairman of the Colorado board of control, who in turn will present B. A. Fowler of Phoenix, Ariz., president of the congress, who was secretary at the Spokane meeting.

Governor John F. Shafroth will welcome the delegates and visitors to the state and Mayor A. L. Fugard will do the honors for the city of Pueblo, the response being by President Fowler. There will also be addresses by western irrigationists, among them being Alva Adams, former governor of Colorado; Frank C. Goudy of Colorado; Dr. George C. Pardee of California and George E. Barstow of Texas, former presidents, and Major R. W. Young of Utah, second vice president of the congress.

"The session on the morning of September 27 will be devoted to irrigation by private enterprise," Mr. Hooker writes, adding: "There will be five or six speakers, including several from the far western states, the plan being to cover as nearly as possible the irrigated districts of the country. Other speakers will be United States Senator Francis G. Newlands of Nevada, Joseph M. Carey, former senator from Wyoming and father of the Carey act, and United States Senator William E. Borah of Idaho. William E. Smythe of Utah, father of the National Irrigation congress, will speak at the evening session."

Drainage, irrigation, agriculture and industrial conditions will be featured on the program arranged for September 28. James J. Hill, chairman of the board of directors of the Great Northern railway, Edward P. Ripley, president of the Santa Fe system; R. S. Lovett, president of the Southern Pacific system and Solom Graves, chief forester of the United States, have been invited to deliver addresses, and in addition there will also be representatives of western states to discuss problems in irrigation. The day's program will close with an illuminated parade.

Water and its uses will be discussed the morning of September 29, the chief speaker being W. K. Cavanaugh, president of the Lakes-to-the-Gulf Deep Waterway association, governors and senators and engineers of western states will also deliver addresses. Members of President Taft's cabinet will discuss the conservation movement at the afternoon session, and matters of legislation will be taken up at the evening session, among the speakers being Senators Hughes and Guggenheim and Representative Martin of Colorado.

The convention will close with the election of officers and the selection of the next place of meeting. San Francisco, Chicago, Rochester, N. Y., Milwaukee, Kansas City and St. Louis, Charleston, S. C., and possibly sever-

## HERMISTON DEPOT WILL BE ENLARGED

### RAILROAD COMMISSIONERS LISTEN TO COMPLAINT

State Board Meets in Hermiston to Consider Complaint that O. R. & N. Facilities Are Not Adequate—Company Submits Plans—Settlers Quarrel Over Ditch Privileges.

(Special Correspondence.)

Hermiston, Ore., July 8.—At 8:30 o'clock this morning the state board of railroad commissioners met in the Hermiston depot for the purpose of considering the complaint made to them by the Pitts-Wied Lumber company, saying that the yard and depot facilities at Hermiston, Oregon, were inadequate. A number of witnesses were called and gave testimony set-

ting forth the plaintiff's allegations and fully showing the commission that the facilities are not up-to-date. Attorney W. W. Cotton represented the O. R. & N. company and in its behalf called Division Superintendent W. Bolons, who submitted numerous plans showing the company's plans for remodeling the present station and building on a 40 foot extension, and said that these plans have been under way for the past year, but from the fact that money had never been appropriated the building was never started, but he would assure the commissioners that work would be started within the next few weeks and that before 90 days the building would be completed at a cost of over \$2000. He contended that the trackage was sufficient for the present needs of Hermiston. The commissioners looked over the ground very carefully and secured all the information they could on the subject. It is likely that a ruling will be made within ten days or two weeks.
