Portland Union Stockyards, North Portland, Ore., July 8.—Spring lambs brought \$5.85 this morning at the yards. The lot sold for this price was in fine condition. A bunch of 242 lambs brought \$5.75, which therefore was considered the top value. The run at the yards was light today and will be light for the week unless receipts are very heavy tomorrow, which is not very likely.

REPORT IS ISSUED AFTER CLOSE OF CHICAGO MARKET

Sensational Decrease in Spring Wheat Estimate Expected to Have Strong Influence on Values.

Chicago, July 8.—The government wheat report was not made public in time to affect today's market, but a sharp advance is looked for tomorrow. The government estimates on the coming crop are:

Wheat in farmers' hands 5.3 per cent, or about 38,739,000; corn area planted, 114,955,000, an increase of 5,312,000 acres, or 4.5 per cent. Yield of spring wheat, 213,000,000 bushels; winter 141,000,000 bushels; oats crop about 1,022,000 indicated.

Liverpool closed 1-4 to 5-8 up on wheat, with corn in sympathy.
