NEW O. R. & N. DEPOT OPENED TO PUBLIC

The new O. R. & N. passenger depot was opened to the public this morning and the transfer from the old to the new building has now been completed. The first tickets sold were by Ticket Agent Smith and they were purchased by passengers going West on No. 1.

Coincident with the commencement of the removal task, House Mover Cornfield began operations preparatory to moving the old structure to its new location, just east of the freight warehouse and this work will be rushed as rapidly as possible. The building is being cut in two and will be moved in two sections.

Work is also being rushed on the concrete walks and altogether there is a general air of activity about the depot grounds. It will probably be several weeks, if not months, before all the changes contemplated are completed, but the occupancy of the new depot is a long step toward that end. Construction work on the building occupied today was started several months ago.

Two Marriage Licenses.
