## SECURING RIGHT OF WAY FOR BIG CUTOFF

Stanfield, Ore., July 14.—The O. R. & N. Co., through its agent, James B. Eddy, is securing right of way deeds for the Stanfield-Coyote cut-off. Mr. Eddy has been here at Stanfield two days and says that the company has already secured 12.5 miles of right of way. The building of the Stanfield Coyote cut-off will shorten the distance between Stanfield and The Dalles about eight miles. The railroad people expect to begin throwing dirt about the 15th of August.

## RUSSIAN DUMA WILL GAIN MORE POWER

St. Petersburg.—The powers of the duma are to be still further increased and it is not improbable that within a few years Russia will have advanced in the path of constitutional government until she is abreast of Prussia. This is the opinion held by many who are high in the favor of the czar. It is stated that his majesty has followed the work of the duma with keen interest. He is convinced that the fact that Russia is less afflicted with active revolutionary ideas than she has been for many years is due in great part to the work of the duma and that a gradual extension of the parliamentary idea means safety, peace and progress. Hence it is his intention to extend the scope of parliamentary authority as rapidly as circumstances will permit. It is understood that he has so expressed himself not only to some of his leading

## BIG PACKING PLANT PLANNED FOR PASCO

Pasco, Wash.—Pasco is to have an up-to-date packing plant. The concern which is promoting the enterprise is the Kennewick Packing company. Mr. Klein, a butcher of this place, is the local manager. A big cold storage plant is being constructed on Mr. Klein's place, two miles west of town, and a large force of men are engaged in rushing the work. The local plant, when completed, will represent an expenditure of about \$20,000, and will be equipped with the most modern machinery. The firm owns plants at Pasco, Kennewick, Richland and Klona, and announces that by combining their interests they will be enabled to give their patrons better service at lower prices.

## Prime Minister Exonerated.

Copenhagen.—The fact that the supreme court has acquitted former Prime Minister Christensen of all knowledge of the \$4,000,000 speculation of former Minister of Justice Alberti causes no surprise. Mr.

Christensen's friends all along have contended that he was as much a victim of Alberti as any one else, and few have believed that the former prime minister was personally dishonest.

The verdict of the court will, however, have no effect on M. Christensen politically. He will never be able to hold office again in the judgment of politicians.

## GAVE SHELTER TO BIRDS.

**Monastery Opened Windows When Snowstorm Came.**  
Rome.—A pretty story reaches Rome from the Alps. The other day an enormous flight of swallows passing from Italy northward over the Alps, near the famous hospice of St. Bernard, were surprised by a heavy snowstorm. The monks, observing the helpless birds like a black cloud approaching, opened the doors and windows, whereupon thousands of the birds swarmed in, seeking shelter against the snow and storm. The refectory, the corridors, the kitchen, and even the monks' cells were crowded by the swallows. The birds remained the whole night, and next morning, the weather being fine, they continued their flight. Many hundreds that did not reach the hospice were afterwards found dead in the snow.

## RAZE OLD POLICE STATION.

One of the landmarks of Chicago to be Torn Down.  
Chicago.—"Harrison street," Chicago's best known police station, is to be torn down. The desk before which many noted criminals have stood while the desk sergeant recorded their names, ages, crimes and such other statistics as were deemed necessary, the cells where they were held pending trial, the courtroom where they were held to the grand jury, all must give way to a modern office building. Action taken by the buildings and grounds committee of the board of education yesterday means the demolition of the old station, the fire house adjoining it and all other buildings on the south 300 feet of the block. That is all school property, and it has been leased to a company which will erect upon it a \$1,500,000 building.

## Rembrandt's House to Be Museum.

Amsterdam.—The house in the Joden Bre-strat, where Rembrandt painted many of his most famous pictures, will shortly be opened to the public. Rembrandt's studio will be made into a small museum, and will contain some precious canvases and etchings of the great master.

## To Teach English in China.

Pekin.—The throne, approving of a recommendation of the board of education, decrees that English shall be the official language for scientific and technical education. The study of English is made compulsory in all provincial scientific and technical high schools.
