

APPEALS TO ALL TO **REORGANIZED CIVIL** PREVENT BIG FIRES SERVICE COMMISSION

TRAVELERS AND CAMPERS ESPECIALLY CAUTIONED

Western Forestry and Conservation Association Makes Appeal for Prevention of Disastrous Forest Fires -Fear Big Ones This Season,

Portland, July 16. - "Fire! Fire! Firef

"This is an alarm of fire. "Do you hear it?

"Will you heed it?

"If the fire has not come yet, it soon will. "You may prevent it.

"You can scarcely stop it,

"Although July has hardly begun a dry spring followed by hot weather has resulted in terrific forest fires throughout the coast states. The tinder-like condition of the woods so early in the season threatens us with one of the worst fire years in history. With the situation already extremely serious, and the usually dry months still to come, the Pacific northwest faces great danger of uncontrollable sweeping fires, before which all offort will be powerless to prevent great destruction of resources if not of human lives. It is a time to appeal to every citizen for vigilance to avert disaster and distress to the community.' In these words the Western For-

estry & Conservation association begins a statement issued today as the result of reports upon the unusually critical forest fire situation received from its subsidiary fire fighting organizations throughout the northwestrn states. All authorities agree that the unusually carly arrival of dan-gerous conditions warrants very grave apprehension. Great detruction has already resulted in Montana, Idaho and California. In Oregon and Washington many fires have broken out and although most have been successfully handled, every day s increasing the danger of conditions which prevent control,

The association calls attention to the fact that very destructive forest fires come in cycles, due to abnormal cars. While in ordinary seasons ountless fires smoulder without serious effect and even the more important ones can usually be checked by sufficient effort, every few years comes a combination of protracted dry weather and wind during which any fire once started becomes almost nstantaneously beyond influence of human endeavor. Such fires burn furiously until checked by rain or ack of fuel and sweep vast areas with great rapidity. The last of these "fire years" was 1902, when many lives, besides resources worth nearly \$80,000,000, were destroyed in Ore-

gon and Washington in a day or two. It is a return of such a catastrophe which is feared if heavy rain does not on relieve the early dryness of In the meanwhile the association




