KING IS COUSIN OF EUROPE.

Edward V. Relative of Many Monarchs.

London.—If the late King Edward was the "Uncle of Europe," surely King George is entitled to be known as the cousin of Europe.

The king is first cousin to the kaiser, the czar of Russia, the king of Norway and the king of Spain. Among the minor kingdoms he is first cousin of the duke of Saxe-Coburg and the duke of Hesse. Close consanguinity also exists between King George and the ruling sovereigns of Sweden, Greece, Roumania, Hohenlohe-Langenburg, and Saxe-Meiningen.

The children of the duke of Connaught carry the ties of consanguinity to Sweden, where Margaret, the duke's eldest daughter, is now the wife of the crown prince, which means that still another of King George's first cousins will occupy a European throne.

The king's youngest uncle, the late duke of Albany, left a son who succeeded to dukedom of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, thus exhibiting still one more first cousin who holds sovereign rank.

The king of Belgium is third cousin to our own king. So is King Manuel of Portugal and King Ferdinand of Bulgaria. Of German cousins, from the emperor downward, there is no end, for the whole of the kaiser's children and grandchildren are King George's second and third cousins, and through the Emperor William's sister he is a cousin to the duke of Sparta, who is crown prince of the Helenes. The king can also claim consanguinity with the Grand Duchess Serge of Russia, all of whom were daughter of his aunt, the late Princess Alice.

Through his mother, Queen Alexandra, King George is cousin to innumerable Danish royalties, and through his Hanoverian ancestry he is related to the duke of Cumberland, the dowager grand duchess of Mecklenburg-Strelitz, and the crown prince of Montenegro. But his relationship must be as endless as varied when one considers that the late Queen Victoria, his famous grandmother, left no fewer than 88 children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. Making allowances for the children

of remote royalty who have passed into mediocrity, it is estimated that King George must have at least 49,000 living relatives, distant and far removed.

Thus it will be seen that his right to the title of "The cousin of Europe" is not an empty one, but one that is justified up to the hilt.

VATICAN HAS TWO WORRIES
Pope's Health Poor and Spain Drifting Away.

Rome.—The situation in Spain and the health of the pope are causing serious concern in the Vatican. It is feared that there is now little chance for an amicable adjustment of the Spanish situation. Cardinal Merry del Val has placed the church in a position from which it can not recede without serious loss of prestige and it is feared the Spanish government will be impelled to go much further along the way of the separation of church and state than it was at first intended.

The situation has weighed heavily on the mind of the pope and has caused a serious breakdown in his physical condition. It is understood in fact that those close to the Holy Father take a most serious view of his condition and would not be surprised at any time if he should break down entirely.

Glasgow, Scotland.—A board of trade returns shows that during the five months ended the 31st of May no fewer than 29,535 passengers left the Clyde for places out of Europe. United States and 15,955 for Canada. Of these 14,101 were bound for the 12 for Australia, and 66 for other places. In the month of May alone 4601 left for Canada and 2837 for the United States.

ADVERTISING TALK NO. 8.

Books could be written about the power of persistency in advertising. It is a subject of which the advertising enthusiast never grows weary.

The other day an advertising man was talking to a well-known Seattle wholesaler. Naturally the conversation drifted to business-getting methods.

This reminded the wholesaler of some follow up letters he had been receiving from an eastern manufacturer. He showed them to the advertising man, saying "What do you think of them?"

The advertising man read them over and vouchsafed the opinion that they were pretty good.

"Pretty good! Well I guess they are!" replied the wholesaler. "If you want to know just how good they are I will tell you."

"Those people have been sending me letters now for several months. I didn't pay much attention to them at first, but finally I became interested in them. I certainly admire their persistency. In fact I admired it so much that the other day I sat down and sent them an order for \$30,000 worth of goods."

Mighty strong argument on the persuasive force of sticktoitiveness, isn't it? A striking illustration for the man who expects to build a business on a one-time advertisement.

The merchant who stays with the advertising day after day and year after year is the one who wins the prize money. It isn't necessary that he write follow-up letters but it is essential that he make use of the columns of the daily newspaper.

The late Mark Twain's story of the spider is apropos at this point. Twain was a newspaper man during several years of his life and was a strong believer in advertising. While addressing an association of advertisement writers one day, he said:

"It pays to advertise. When I was editing the Virginia City Enterprise, writing copy one day and minding the next, I tried to force this truth in many ways.

"A superstitious subscriber once wrote and said he had found a spider on his paper; was this good luck or bad? I replied to him in our answers-to-correspondents' column as follows:

"Old Subscriber—The finding of a spider in your copy of the Enterprise was neither good luck nor bad. The spider was merely looking over the pages to find out what merchant was not advertising, so it could spin its web across the door and lead a free and undisturbed existence forever after."

It is wonderful when you stop to think of it, that you can talk to every thinking man and woman in your city every day. You can do this very thing. It is made possible through the daily newspaper, a modern institution that for greatness ranks with the telephone, the telegraph and the electric railway.

You can't expect a salesman to solicit business from more than a few dozen people a day at best, and yet, through newspapers and magazines, you can solicit trade from millions of people in the same length of time, if you choose.
